Earlier in the day Henry L. Stevens, Jr., national commander of the American Legion, in a radio address, praised the valor of America's war dead and said the American Legion would again make "similar sacrifices" if the call came.

START WORK UPON G. O. P. PLATFORM

WASHINGTON, May 30—(AP)—Actual work on the delicate task of framing the republican platform began today in conferences at the White House and the capitol.

James R. Garfield, of Ohio, son of the late president, emerged as the chairman of the all-important republican resolutions committee and talked with republican senate leaders to get their views.

President Hoover called in Senator Borah, of Idaho, the prohibition leader, for another conference on his idea for the knotty prohibition plank.

Borah who has drafted a plank outlining his views maintained silence on the White House parley but indicated he contemplated no change in his plan to remain away from the convention.

DENVER, Colo., May 30—(AP)—Prevailing trends of modern life were heavily scored at today's session of the 144th general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the U. S. A.

Marriage and divorce, the radio, movies, prohibition and Sunday amusements were targets for speakers' darts of wrath. The entire scheme of things was summed up by the Rev. William Chalmers Covert of Philadelphia as a "culture without Christ."

Minor changes in the chapter of marriage in the directory of worship were approved by the assembly. An entirely new section gave tacit approval of physical examinations for parties to the marriage contract and a limited, supervised practice of eugenics.

The assembly likewise approved a new section calling upon ministers to "exercise great care lest they join together those whose marriage the church cannot approve. Upon satisfactory evidence of the facts in the case, they may remarry the innocent party to whom a divorce has been granted on scriptural grounds," a year after the divorce has been granted.

SUMMER SESSION WILL BE POPULAR

The five and one-half weeks elementary summer school which will be held in the Grant and Park buildings beginning June 13 probably will have an enrollment exceeding last year's 300, according to Miss Charlotte Crowley, elementary supervisor, who will be director of the summer sessions.

This year's school will have a strong staff of critic teachers from Oregon normal school and Salem public schools.

The purposes of the summer sessions are to enable students to make up work missed on account of sickness, to build students in their weak subjects, to prepare them for the junior high school method of study, and generally to enrich their educational experiences.

Grading Started On Salem-Brooks Highway Section

First grading on the Salem to Brooks \$125,000 improvement job began late last week when a large grading machine began widening the road near Brooks. Alignment stakes have already been placed by highway engineers from Brooks south to the Lake Umbagog section of the road. Widening and straightening of the road will be underway in full force within a few days. The contract calls for completion of the project by September 15.

The alignment through the Lake Umbagog territory is to be considerably straightened. In numerous places dips in the road will be eliminated through an improvement in the grade. When the job is done, the road will be paved for a full 20-foot width with a six-foot rock shoulder placed on each side of the pavement.
