W. U. FACULTY PAY REDUCTION LIKELY

University Income is Less And Retrenchment for Next Year Viewed

Reductions in income are expected to necessitate some reductions in compensation of the faculty at Willamette university, it was stated by Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president, yesterday. At present the university officials are working on the budget for next year, and faced with the prospect of a deficiency are considering the extent of the reduction which must be made.

This year, Pres. Doney said, the income has been reduced through lessened income from endowment, as well as from some other sources. Income from some investments has failed during the business readjustment, and some funds have accumulated and not been invested because of uncertainty in business fields. The current expenses and current income for the year just about balance, there was a deficit of \$8,000 carried forward from last year, so the year will end with a slight deficiency again.

Willamette has been more fortunate than many similar institutions of the northwest where drastic cuts in faculty salaries. Conservation of endowment funds has given the university a stable source of support even in years of business adversity.

Financial reports will be heard at the meeting of the board of trustees June 11.

Suit to determine whether Karl Heusser has \$1500 due him from Libby, McNeil and Libby on a contract for the purchase of cucumbers by the defendant corporation, was under way late yesterday in circuit court here. The morning was occupied with getting a jury and opening statements of counsel and a legal fight in Judge L. H. McMahon's chambers over the proposed introduction of certain evidence took up the bulk of the afternoon.

A crowded courtroom yesterday heard the case start. Other cucumber raisers felt the case is a test one. Heusser claims the cucumbers graded down his cucumbers to a price which was unfair. The cannery maintain they fulfilled the provisions of their contract. It is not expected that the case will go to the jury before tonight.
