E. was a son of the original John Aiken. pioneer ferryman of Winchester. building up a fortune there, as heretofore mentioned-a part of which fortune went into Roseburg's first bank and Salem's first department store.

The widow of the original John Alken died in Salem. She was Mary E., and her estate was settled by Joseph S. Aiken, her son, as administrator. "Joe," as he was known to his familiars, the writer remembers, in Roseburg and Salem, was dapper and dandified. He was a gentlemanly barkeeper and saloon keeper in Douglas county's shire town and in the capital city. At the time of the mother's death, Geo. E. 


