

BROWN, RAY IN ELECTION TALK

Race for Master of State Grange may be Between These two men

SILVERTON, June 11.—Ray W. Gill of Portland and Arthur Brown of southern Oregon are the two candidates for the mastership of the state grange. It was learned at Silvertown Saturday. However, nothing definite will be known about the election until the nominating committee reports its findings following its session Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock. Election will be held between 7 o'clock and 8:30 p. m. Wednesday evening.

Grangers for the State Grange convention to open officially at Silvertown Tuesday morning, will begin arriving here Sunday afternoon. Although the formal opening will not be until Tuesday morning a program of sports will be carried out Monday evening. The famous annual horseshoe pitching contest will be held in the city park beginning at 8:30 p. m. Adams is Greeter.

The visitors are to be officially welcomed to the community Tuesday morning at 10:30 by Earl J. Adams, president of the local chamber of commerce. The responses to the welcoming address will be made by M. C. Glover, the state master.

At the end of Tuesday afternoon's session the chamber of commerce, with the aid of various districts of the community will serve the grangers strawberries, cream and cake.

The master's address will be delivered by Mr. Glover Tuesday afternoon at the Eugene Field auditorium.

Competitive drills of subordinated and juvenile grangers will be held at the Silvertown armory Thursday afternoon. The fifth and sixth degrees will be exemplified Thursday evening at the armory, beginning at 7:30. Installation of the new officers will be held Friday afternoon at 1:30.

At sometime during the convention, a time to be chosen upon the arrival of the grangers so that it will be at a time most convenient to them, the visitors will be taken on a trip to Oregon's newest state park, the Silver Creek Falls park and will be given an opportunity to see the 10 famous Silver Creek falls. It is understood that the morning the trip is to be made the breakfast will be served in the Silvertown Hills Community clubhouse.

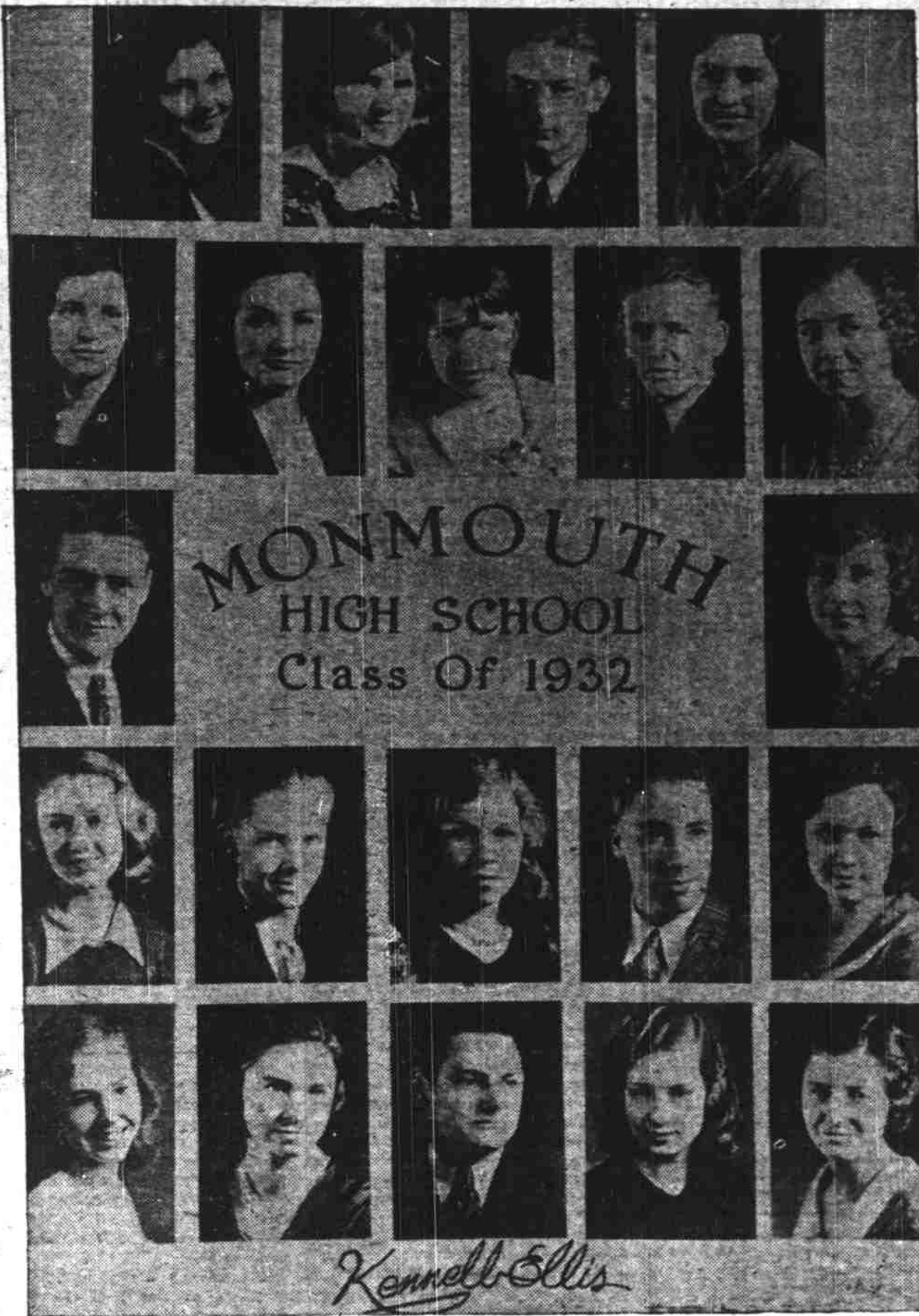

MULKEYS MARRIED NEARLY 61 YEARS

Monmouth man Recalls Blizzard in Which Nearly 4000 Horses Lost

MONMOUTH, June 11.—Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Mulkey of this city will observe their 61st wedding anniversary Wednesday, June 15, at their home.

They were married in the old Umatilla House at The Dalles, June 15, 1871, driving there with team and buckboard from Antelope, 80 miles, as The Dalles was the nearest place where a marriage license could be secured. Accompanying them then were Mr. and Mrs. William Quinn, the latter a sister of the bride, Miss Emily Porter.

Both the Porter and Mulkey families were engaged in the cattle business in eastern Oregon at that time; but were natives of the Willamette valley. Emily Porter was born Dec. 22, 1855 at Halsey. Mr. Mulkey was born Nov. 22, 1848 near Corvallis.

As the sheep industry invaded eastern Oregon ranges, the cattle business slumped. Mr. Mulkey and Mr. Quinn sold 4,000 head to Cheyenne buyers and started in June to drive them to Wyoming where they were to receive \$10 a head on delivery. They were well equipped with drivers and horses and a cook wagon with ample food stored. As the animals were thin from the long winter they made headway leisurely, following ranges and canyons where grass and water were plentiful.

In October they crossed the line into Wyoming territory when suddenly they were confronted by one of those menacing blizzards of that section. Those in the party who realized their grave danger urged immediate abandonment of everything. Fortunately they were near a railroad station, and made their way there before blinding snow blocked the trail.

The next spring Mr. Mulkey with others of the group returned to the scene and managed to round up 65 head of the original 4,000. In the haste of their departure during the snow, a few horses had been left tethered to a wagon, and the skeletons of those poor creatures evidenced their fate.

The Mulkeys had now located at Monmouth where they were engaged in farming until 1919, when the family home was established in town. They have six children: Mrs. Milton McGowan, Independence; Mrs. Charles Holman, Chehalis, Wash.; Mrs. W. R. Adams, Mrs. Blanche Sloan, Hartley and Merle Mulkey, Monmouth. There are 19 grandchildren; and 7 great-grandchildren.

June 21, Dr. Gordon will go to conference and at that time will likely be transferred elsewhere.

Dr. and Max Gordon plan to live in their own home in Portland and hoping that Dr. Gordon's work will be near enough to make this feasible, Dr. Gordon is not planning on retiring from active work as a pastor in the Methodist church, he stated this week.
