

ASTORIA BIDS FOR STEAMBOAT MEET

Would Move Annual Event From Champoe for The First Time

Effort to take the annual convention of the Veteran Steamboatmen of the West to Astoria next year will be made at the 1932 gathering at Champoe June 26, Jack Routh, former Salem young man and city editor of the Astoria Budget, said while here recently. To this end, Astoria will send an extra large delegation to the convention this year.

If the Astoria invitation should appeal to the 500 visitors expected June 26, it will be the first time the convention has gone from Champoe.

Astoria is particularly anxious to get the convention, in order to hold it at Fort Dodge in connection with the annual Astoria Regatta, revived this year.

Enroute to Salem, Routh stopped in Portland to confer with Captain Arthur Riggs, Portland river pilot and now in his fourth year as president of the Veteran Steamboatmen. This year, instead of traveling from Portland by boat, the visitors from Astoria, Portland, Seattle and other northern points will come by train as far as Wilsonville, there taking the steamer Northwestern to Champoe, arriving at 10:45. The excursionists will leave at the Jefferson street Oregon Electric station in Portland at 8:15 a. m. June 26.

A feature of the convention program this year will be appearance of the Seaside Girls' band. This band will broadcast over KXL from 9 to 9:30 and over KOIN from 10:30 to 11 o'clock the night before the convention.

Each year a steamboat, its history and master are featured on the Champoe program, and this year it will be the T. J. Potter, fastest side-wheeler used on the Pacific coast and used as an excursion boat between Portland and the beaches. Its hull now lies in Young's bay at Astoria. Capt. J. W. Troup, owner and builder of the vessel, passed away the past year.

Several river pilots who were members of the first crew of the T. J. Potter will attend the convention, among them being Capt. Ed Sullivan, master pilot for the longest period.

Cherrians Will Appear Friday In Rose Parade

Salem Cherrians will march in the parade of the Portland Rose festival next week, states King Bing Gus Hixon. Also Salem will be represented by a float. Members of the Cherrians are selling Rose festival buttons here in Salem and the proceeds will finance the float.

The parade Friday will climax the events of Rose Festival week in Portland. This is the first time for several years that the Salem premier marching organization has appeared in the parade.

CHILE POLICIES WORRY INVESTORS

Although the revolutionary junta which Carlos Davila recently installed in Chile to take the place of President Juan Esteban Montero's government has as yet made no move towards the confiscation of foreign property in the country, American and British concerns, who are the principal stakeholders in Chilean industries, are anxiously watching the progress of events in the new regime. Observers in touch with Chilean affairs at Washington are inclined to accept with reserve reports that Davila, a former ambassador to the U. S., would embark upon a program that would stamp Chile as communist. During the new Provisional President's sojourn in Washington he was one of the most popular of the foreign diplomats and considered one of the best friends of the United States. But former associates recall that Davila made no secret of his leanings towards communism in a modified form. Meanwhile, while British and American investors, who have over \$1,100,000,000 sunk in the Chilean copper and nitrate industry, as well as Chilean loans, are waiting a clear declaration of policy by the new junta, the State Department at Washington is silent upon its intentions as to whether or not the revolutionary government will be recognized. It is expected several weeks will elapse before a decision is reached, even should the revolution quickly demonstrate its success and good intentions towards American interests.

Under the Dome...

Occurrences and Gossip at the center of Oregon's state government

CHARLES P. PRAY, superintendent of state police, was back at headquarters here yesterday after official business in eastern and southern Oregon. He said he found it as hot if not hotter all week than it was in Salem. He was at his desk with coat of arms and sleeves rolled up when he made that remark.

Well, the republican convention opens in Chicago today, and about the hottest thing about the meeting will be the weather. And naturally, as is customary, something at such conventions, the outer convention atmosphere will be much wetter than the proposed plank for the prohibition question.

And while the party leaders make much ado about nothing in Chicago, the second round of the education fight for the week will be fought before the Oregon supreme court. The proponents and the opponents of the consolidation bill will argue over what title the matter should be presented to the voters in November.

The first round was fought yesterday when advocates and fighters of the proposed initiative were heard by the committee of the state grange in the hot room on the third floor of the capitol building. A check after the sound of the gong late in the afternoon indicated the committee won the first advantage.

But the debate was very courteous. Even Hector Macpherson, who sometimes becomes all warmed up during an argument, made a fine presentation of the main debate for the bill, while William Turman, managing editor of the Eugene Guard, countered with a defense for the present unified system of the state board of higher education.

There were several interesting highlights noted at this hearing on education. In the first place, Mrs. Walter Pierce is chairman of the grange committee which will make its recommendation to the grange this week and she is also a member of the state board of higher education. The public will no doubt learn soon whether she is in accord with her own activities on the board, or will offer at them in her report.

Also there is one thing the committee failed to learn yesterday, as did some of the proponents of the initiative and the opponents—that was who was financing the campaign for the physical consolidation. Henry Zorn, who appears to head the movement, refused to answer the question, so Corvallis business men and others no doubt will be saved embarrassment.

Naturally Corvallis is interested in the matter, as it would give the city a big boost to have the one university there. Even Claude Ingalls, capable and clever editor of the Corvallis Gazette-Times, who seldom goes to hearings, was present yesterday and injected a question or two. Ingalls, however, did not express himself at the hearing either for or against the bill.

Senator Wheeler of Lane county and Henry Zorn also were heard by the committee, the former opposed and the latter in favor of the measure. Dr. E. E.

Lindsay, secretary of the state board of education, was also called upon to clear up some points relative to financing and curricula changes in the board's coordinated system of education.

Macpherson, however, at times resorted to his old style of debate noted so frequently in the house of representatives, that of making dynamic statements concerning actions and individuals. He made serious charges against the ability of J. A. Churchill and frequently took sharp shots at the entire faculties of state institutions.

But it will probably all come out all right after something or other is done about the measure. Zorn suggested that instead of scrapping the Monmouth Normal school buildings and equipments, it be used for a state training school for girls. What would the state do with the present training school? Come again, Mr. Zorn.

At any rate there was considerable interest in the hearing and some pertinent points were brought out on both sides of the question. This is another case of three sides to a question. Who was it that said "There are always three sides to a question, your side, my side and the right side"?

Wayne Pettit returned from his two weeks' vacation looking fit and all pepped up for another year of the newspaper grind. The next year however will be the toughest one again as another legislative session is in the offing, and it looks like it will be a dandy.

SUPPORT OF LABOR DEFENSE MOVE HIT

Organization is Right arm Of Communism, Bonham Says in Address

Denouncing the International Labor Defense as the right arm of communism and defending the state's criminal syndicalism law as the only weapon the state had for defense against communist insurrection and bloodshed, R. P. Bonham of Portland, district director of the U. S. immigration service, spoke with vigor in addressing the chamber of commerce luncheon yesterday noon on the work of his department.

He defended the immigration officials from charges of harsh treatment. He said nearly all men in the service were career men who had dedicated their lives to the service of the United States. "They seek to administer the law as sincerely and conscientiously as any court."

After mentioning his investigation work in communist activities across the country, Bonham launched his attack on the International Labor Defense

league, which he said was officered by members of the communist party. That communism in this country still believed in bloody revolution to effect its purposes, Bonham declared was attested by the speech of acceptance of William Z. Foster, its last candidate for president. He criticized "ministers, college professors and an ex-governor who joined with the International Labor Defense to repeal this state's only law against communist riot and outbreak and revolution."

Referring to other work of the immigration service, Bonham described the near apprehension of a gigantic smuggling operation on the southwest Oregon coast. He and his men, disguised as fishermen, were on hand as the smugglers' craft bearing \$9,000,000 worth of opium and 193 contraband Chinese, including seven females for white slavery purposes, was about to make a landing. They located the San Francisco shore man who was guarding against surprise. The capture was not made because the coast guard boat which had been ordered to cooperate, bungled its end of it and the smuggler ship received a radio message and put back to China, where it was seized by the British.

At the present time the law keeps out most candidates for admission to this country, only 43,000 being received. Before the

war this country received from Austria, Russia and Italy more people than now reside in Oregon. If restriction had not been imposed, our racial identity would have been lost.

Mr. Bonham grew up in Salem and had many old-time friends out to see him.

Copies of Prohibition Fund Report Not Public, is Ruled

County treasurers are not permitted to give copies of statements of receipts and expenditures of the prohibition fund filed by the district attorneys and sheriffs to private citizens, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down Monday.

Van Winkle held that inspection of these statements is prohibited by the Oregon statutes, although the courts have authority to grant such a request.

The opinion was requested by Earl A. Nott, district attorney of Yamhill county.
