

WEEKEND CRASHES INJURE 6 PERSONS

Brooks Woman is Hurt Most
Seriously; 2 Arrested
As Drunk Drivers

Six persons were injured and two were jailed as the result of four automobile accidents in and around Salem over the weekend. One of the victims was still confined to a hospital last night.

Miss Alvina Hahn, 44, of Brooks was most severely injured in a collision between cars driven by Charles R. Cutsinger of Brooks and E. H. Craig, 1785 South Capitol street, at Liberty and high streets, Sunday night. She lay in Salem Deaconess hospital last night, suffering from severe bruises.

Others receiving minor injuries in the crash were: Minnie Cutsinger, 10; Elmer Cutsinger, eight, and Clarence Cutsinger, all of Brooks. The Cutsinger car was demolished.

Craig, arrested on a charge of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, as the result of this accident, yesterday pleaded guilty before Municipal Judge Poulson. Unable to furnish \$500 bail, he was held in the city jail. Police records reveal that Craig was arrested on December 9, 1928, for drunkenness and unlawful possession of liquor, and also on February 2, 1931, for drunken driving. He was fined \$50 each time.

S. M. Bush, fairgrounds, who was arrested Saturday on a drunk driving charge, also pleaded guilty Monday. He was held in the city jail in lieu of \$500 bail.

Little Imogene McIntosh, 4, of 597 Liberty street, suffered facial bruises and a skinned knee as the result of an unusual type of accident at Center and Liberty streets. As she stepped upon a slack cable between a car and truck, the driver started up, and the cable threw the little girl to the sidewalk. The car was driven by Walter Nelson of Portland.

Claudia Buntin, 20, of Salem, received a severe laceration on her left foot, when a car in which she was riding, ran into a ditch on Riverside drive, three miles south of here.

Leroy E. Grote, route one, driver of the car, said the accident was caused by the front wheel of the car slipping off the pavement.

State Grange Head Urges Stronger Prohi Support; Hits at Salary Wastes

SILVERTON, June 14 — Hitting at state and federal expenditures which he characterized as reckless and extravagant, charging the state grange to reaffirm its support of the 18th amendment, asking for readjustment of taxation and freedom for the Philippines, State Grange Master M. C. Glover of Clackamas county, this afternoon delivered his annual address to the convention which opened this morning.

Excerpts from Glover's address follow: "Our state grange should emphatically reaffirm its support of the 18th amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors and the Volstead Enforcement act. Paid propaganda supplied by the wets is being published by the subsidized press. The best proof that prohibition is fairly effective is that it arouses the resentment and anger of the persons who have an appetite for alcoholic beverages."

"The federal government and some states are levying income taxes which hit the wealthy private hard. So the Raskobs and other men of wealth began to look for a way to shift the burden off their backs. They put up a plea for 4 per cent beer with a three-cent per quart federal tax, hoping thereby to again shift this burden upon the poor."

"The 18th amendment must be retained. The Volstead act and the Anderson bone dry law must be enforced. Cut Radio Costs "Radio station KOAC at Corvallis is costing the taxpayers of Oregon \$36,000 a year. No doubt some good is being accomplished by this service, but we do not feel that enough is being done and enough people being reached to warrant that expenditure during these times. If this station is to continue, the cost of operation should be greatly reduced."

On Agriculture "The condition of agriculture is deplorable. Our incomes have been reduced from 50 to 90 per cent while taxes and overhead remain almost the same. Taxes must be reduced and more evenly distributed. The bulk of taxes should be shifted from property to salaries and incomes. We recommend the income initiative measure being sponsored by the governor's tax reduction league."

Grange Master Glover rapped federal expenditures last year of nearly \$17,000,000 for real estate purchase in Washington, D. C. salary of \$8,000 for sergeant-at-arms and similar national government salaries, and declared a hundred million dollars would have been saved by consolidating the army and navy.

Commending state savings effected by Governor Meier and Treasurer Holman, he continued: "But we believe that still greater savings could and should be made. Extravagances are still being practiced in many places throughout the state." He cited monthly salaries of \$760 to seven on payroll in connection with the battleship Oregon; criticized the cost of the board of cosmetic therapy, considering work is accomplished, and pay of \$10 a day while serving on the board to Dr. Stricker, ex-officio member who receives \$400 a month salary as head of the state board of health. He asked for uniform rate of pay for state house clerks, 50 per cent cut in \$12,000 a year state employees. Support of the tax on oleomargarine was asked and Philippine independence, a bill for which is now in the senate. Glover urged making navigable the Willamette and Columbia rivers, particularly as such would lower freight rates; and asked for more care in expenditures on the state educational system.

TEACHERS PURCHASE WOODBURN'S HOTEL

WOODBURN, June 14 — A business transaction, whereby the Woodburn hotel changed hands, was announced by the new owners, Miss Mary Mattley and Miss Esther Hettinger, both of Marshfield. Mrs. S. A. Mattley, who has been operating the hotel for about five years, has moved to Portland, where she expects to buy a home. Miss Mary Mattley is her daughter. Both she and Miss Hettinger taught in the Marshfield high school last year and several years before. Mattley was the principal and Miss Hettinger was head of the English department.

The new owners are making a number of improvements on the hotel. They are putting in several new bathrooms. The hotel, which is located on Garfield street, was bought by Mrs. Mattley about five years ago.

NEWBERG, June 14 — The fortieth annual session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of the Friends church closed after the unanimous selection of Chester A. Hadley of Portland as general superintendent for the coming year, on the nomination of the newly appointed executive committee.

The closing business day of the yearly meeting was marked by the annual educational reports and the report of the department of home missions and social service.

At the educational session, presided over by Prof. Floyd W. Pershke of Pacific college, who read his annual report, following it by a brief address, reports were also received from Greenleaf seminary, and from the Pacific college corporation, treasurer, auxiliary, and from the president of the college, Louis T. Emlington, who followed his report with a brief address.

Five members of the Pacific college board were reelected for a term of three years: Laura Hamner of Portland, Anna B. Miles of Salem, Joseph W. McCracken of Scotts Mills, Clarence Edwards of Portland and Curtis W. Parker of Newberg.

The report of the home mission and social service department was made by Gertrude Hodson of Chehalis Center, and showed extensive activities in this department. The report was followed by an able address by Charles C. Haworth of Salem.

An action was taken on the subject of divorce, which usually affects Friends very little. Ministers were advised against remarriage in case of divorce, even in the case of the innocent party in a divorce on scriptural grounds; and where this advice is not heeded, it was advised that such ministers be removed from their places of leadership.

The final day was marked by large crowds, as has been the yearly meeting from its beginning. Evangelistic meetings and meetings for worship were held at 8:00, 11:00, 3:00, and 8:00, with special Bible school arrangements to accommodate the large crowd.

POSTAL RATES ARE EFFECTIVE JULY 6

The new postage rates imposed by congress will go into effect on July 6. Postmaster John H. Farrah announced yesterday. The letter rate will be three cents while that for postal and postcards will remain at one cent. Airmail rates

will be increased from five to eight cents, with 15 cents for each additional ounce in contrast with 10 cents as at present. Second class matter also will require more postage. The pound rates by zones will be as follows: First and second, two cents; third, three cents; fourth, five cents; fifth, six cents; sixth, seven cents; seventh, nine cents; eighth, including District of Columbia, Philippines and other United States territory, 10 cents. The new second class rates are the same as used in 1921.
