High spots of the new republican platform were:

Whole hearted endorsement of the Hoover leadership in the economic crisis.

Participating in international conference on monetary questions, including silver.

Establishment of a home loan discount system.

Encouragement of cooperative marketing through the federal farm board; support of "any plan which will help agriculture balance production against demand"; promotion of a national land utilization policy.

Tariff Changes Due To Finance Shift

Revision through the tariff commission of duties affected by depreciated currencies of foreign countries.

Tariff protection for national resources, including products of forests, farms, mines and oil wells.

Revision of veterans' legislation to eliminate inequalities and to effect all possible economies.

Enactment of legislation to authorize participation by the United States in an international conference in event of a threat against the Kellogg peace pact.

Participation in the world court.

Declaration for principle of high wages and short working hours.

Federal regulation of electric current transmitted across state lines.

Development of the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence seaway.

Rigid laws against gangsters, racketeers and kidnapers.

It was an administration hand-fashioned platform and bore the stamp of the Hoover policies from start to finish.

ing. It was largely through the efforts of the agricultural committees of that county that the Wallowa County Creamery association with over 100 members owning more than 1500 cows began operation last November 1.

In Douglas county the agricultural committees were active in soliciting members for and supporting the Douglas County Livestock Growers' association, which marketed 4093 lambs in cooperative pools, which aided in maintaining local prices.

Seventy-six of the 119 reporting committees told of cooperative pools which they have been instrumental in forming which, in the aggregate, resulted in large savings.

"The matter has already been taken up with authorities in Washington, with the idea of getting a formal application in for the city of Salem at the earliest opportunity.

Unable to open the cash register, the boys fled without getting any money for their efforts, he said. Just before attempting this robbery, Franz stole an automobile a block away from the Portland east side police station.

Car theft seems a mania of Franz. Officers state he told them of at least 40 automobiles which he had stolen.

Asked as to why they committed the robberies, the boys told the police they wanted the money, were not just out for a thrill.
