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of its return will be for appropriated and unused capital expenditures. The \$150,000 emergency fund levied for 1932 will be almost wholly unused. The forthcoming salary cut will add another large item to the reduction totals. Every department is going to be able to make some economies. Lumping the entire sum together may see total reductions of \$600,000 this year in the \$5,579,000 of 1932. The state would then have a balanced budget instead of \$2,600,000 short as planned when the levy was made December 27, 1931.

There has been much discussion in years past about the state deficit. The late Governor Kay was prone to disregard it as merely a bookkeeping device holding that the state never had a deficit as long as the treasury had money in the till or in the bank. Actually the deficit is the sum of money which at the end of any year would be needed to pay all the bills payable of the state after all income due that year.

Because many of the state's fees are received in advance, the state can carry a considerable deficit without being out of cash except at times of the year when large withdrawals are needed such as the payment of state highway bonds and interest. At those periods the treasurer must borrow on the state's credit for a short period to repay the highway fund for money he is required to turn over to meet current obligations.

It is obvious that the larger the state's deficit becomes the more frequent borrowing the state must resort to. Interest rates will be prone to rise as larger sums are demanded, as repaid earlier, made over a longer period and as the deficit increases makes the state's borrowings steadily larger.

BURDETTE SAYS HE CAN'T BE MUZZLED

Mr. Burdette's statement was in reply to a threat made by John Ramage, member of the executive committee of the Marion county tax league, that the school consolidation organization would throw its weight against Governor Meier's tax reduction program unless the governor halted Burdette's attack on the school merger bill.

GRANGE FAVORS CHANGE IN LAW

Abolition of State Budget
Office and Others is
Another Proposal

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resolution. Reduction of the federal land bank rate of interest on farm loans to a maximum of 5 percent was advocated in another resolution.

Abolition of every state office "not indispensable under our system of government" was recommended. Specifically the office of state budget director paying \$600 annually, which was "created as a political plum and is not indispensable" was mentioned. Legislative committee was authorized to inaugurate measures in the next legislative session to abolish this office.

Limiting the right to vote on special tax levies or on bond issues to taxpayers was a topic of another resolution which was passed. The legislative committee was instructed to secure a constitutional amendment changing section 2 of Article 2 to bring this about.

A complete liquidation of a mortgage upon foreclosure was advocated. The resolution which contained this recommendation pointed out that while many farms are lost in foreclosure proceedings, farmers are not even then freed of their financial burden. The proposed measure would eliminate deficiency judgments.

Criminal Syndicalism Law Repealed
Repeal of the criminal syndicalism law was asked of the legislature at its next session.

Change in the state law governing sale of strychnine alcohol for gopher poisoning was urged. The grangers desire to have the poison sold direct to farmers by county agricultural agents.

Dissolution of the Salmon river super road district was advocated in one of the last resolutions adopted. The state was requested to assume the unpaid balance of \$120,000 due on the highway. It was pointed out that the promoters of the road district estimated the cost at \$35,000, while it actually cost over \$200,000.

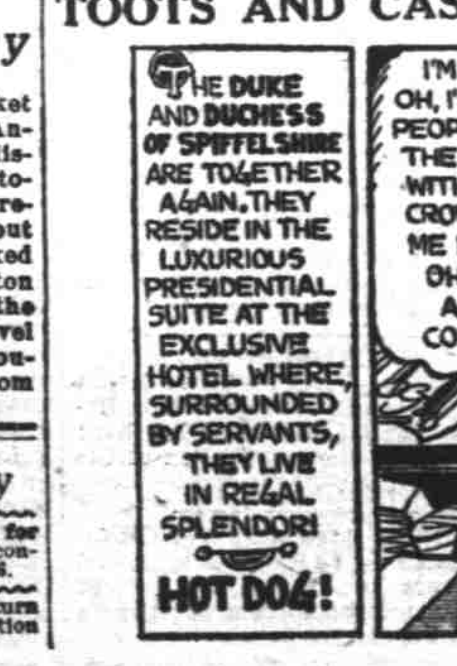

Davis Estate's Value \$135,088

Mrs. Cornelia A. Davis, Turner philanthropist who died recently, left an estate valued at \$135,088, an appraisal filed yesterday in probate court reveals. Of her holdings, 109,000 of valuation is in real property, ranging from Turner lots to several large farms. The total acreage of the inventoried farms is 2594. In the estate are several \$500 blocks of bonds, most of Canadian issue. The bonds in total are appraised at \$26,430. The appraisal was made by Henry G. Porter, Jack Miller and E. T. Barnes. S. M. Endicott is executor of the estate.

ALDERMEN FACING VARIED QUESTIONS

Wood retailing, civil service for Salem policemen, and the proper care of stray dogs are diverse questions which the Salem city council has docketed for consideration Monday night.

The ordinance committee is scheduled to make an unfavorable report on a measure which would put a \$100 license fee on each retail wood dealer in the city. Proposed by the larger dealers, the measure is aimed at street sellers of wood who are claimed to have cut prices and ruined volume for the established yards. Nevertheless the committee feels the ordinance discriminatory and liable to create a closed circle for the distribution of wood.

Another committee will report favorably upon an ordinance which would add the city police department to the fire department in the requirement that city service requirements be met by employees. The ordinance provides for submitting the necessary charter amendment at the November election here.

The proposed change in handling stray dogs is to have the police department do the work instead of the street department where the dog chasing duties now are handled.

SEVEN NOMINATED ON BOTH TICKETS

Seven republican members of the present county courthouse official staff and a full ticket of representatives in the state legislature from Marion county, were nominated on the democratic ticket to oppose themselves in the general campaign, certificates of nomination issued yesterday by County Clerk Boyer reveal.

In each instance the incumbents were uncontested for their offices within the republican party and were unopposed by any democratic aspirants for the nomination in that party. As a result the republicans received a scattering democratic vote but enough to give them the nomination.
