The city's playgrounds at Olinger and Lincoln fields yesterday together drew around 600 children. Activities of all sorts were well under way.

At Lincoln, a small boys' ball team was organized with Jack Lunsford as coach and the children's crayon hour started under direction of Mary E. Purvine. Tom Gabriel won the day's bean bag match.

Coming events at Lincoln are the grab bag on Friday, with each child bringing some wrapped article, a croquet tournament, and a quilting bee for the older girls. The quilt the girls plan to sell to obtain funds for playground equipment. Margaret E. Nelson, director, is conducting her story hour each day.

Starting today, a council hour will be held at Olinger playground at 1:45 o'clock each afternoon. At this time, matters of discipline will be taken up, announcements made and a 15-minute entertainment put on by the children. On Friday the child entertainers will broadcast their numbers over the Cherry City Baking company's announcer car in charge of Gardner Knapp.

THE state purchasing agent was credited today with bringing the Hooker Electric Chemical company, the large plant at Tacoma over which Portland and Tacoma fought several years ago, to the west coast. But that was before the party mentioned was purchasing agent.

Albert Hooker, general manager of the Tacoma plant, was at the capitol yesterday to visit his friend, William Einzig. Later when he met the governor and Rufus Holman, Hooker told them that Einzig was responsible for the company's big plant being in the west. A fine compliment, Bill.

William MacSwain, of the federal secret service who operates out of Portland, stopped in Salem yesterday to visit with the state police department. MacSwain was at Silverton on governmental duties and came here to look up his friend of more than 25 years standing, Charles P. Pray.

Lou Himes, well-known hotel man now of Condon, was a capitol visitor yesterday. He formerly operated hotels at Roseburg and Portland. Himes reported there was considerable tourist travel in eastern Oregon and indications were that the tourist crop would average better than most any other kind of business.

Rufus Holman commented yesterday that he learned his Portland business was losing money over the weekend. The governor replied he was lucky if they just lost over the weekend, but "wait," said Holman, "I meant I discovered over the weekend that they were losing money. Increase in the number of tourists going through and stopping at Salem was noted the past few days by the many people visiting the state capitol and the grounds. All day yesterday there was a steady stream of visitors looking over Oregon's capitol buildings and the widely famous trees.
