

# LAMBERT CHERRIES ARRIVE ON MARKET

First Blackberries Appear From Roseburg, Sells \$1 for Half Crate

Portland, June 22.—(AP).—Continued decrease in offerings of eggs is noticeable on the local market but there is little actual improvement in the price situation. The local market is better in a sentimental way with the removal of some of the former depressing factors.

Latest survey of the situation indicates that the farm egg lay is decreasing very rapidly. Decreasing the worst competition in the trade, inasmuch as many farmers sell direct to retailers and usually 1 to 2¢ below the market as established.

Trade in the butter market continues to reflect practical steadiness for both prints and cubes. There appears a sufficient supply for all needs at the moment.

In general a weak tone is reflected in the market for live chickens along the wholesale way. There was no further change in the price list but demand was just able to absorb supplies.

Practically no changes in the price list on country killed meats was shown for the day although veal offerings are of fair volume. Sales of hogs, veal and lambs were made within the price range.

Further slide in prices is suggested for tomatoes, including both hothouse and outdoor stock. The market is being badly congested and the trend of values appears still lower.

Trifle slower tone appeared generally in the markets for berries. Strawberries were about a dime lower. Raspberries were also lower with a nominal call. It was difficult to move loganberries.

First shipment of blackberries of the season appeared with a half crate of fancy fruit from the Roseburg section. The stock was grown by C. N. Howard of Lookoutglass. Sold \$1 for the half crate.

First Lambert cherries of the season were also received. These were from Maryhill, Wash., and consisted of 3 boxes of 15 lbs., which sold \$1.50 box. Entire cherry market is reported slow at low prices.

# BIG GUNS IN PLAY AT FORT STEVENS

FT. STEVENS, June 22.—Sunday a part of Battery B went over to Fort Canby to test the guns out, as they had not been used for 11 years.

This year Ft. Canby is being used as work which interferes with the use of Ft. Columbia is being done on the jetty. Usually the guns are fired from Fort Columbia which is directly across the river from Fort Stevens, but many of the shells bounce from the water and strike the jetty or the beach beyond. In order to get away from this, Battery B is going to fire service from Fort Canby into the ocean.

Several men from Headquarters and the men from the Medical detachment will accompany the Battery. They leave Fort Stevens Tuesday afternoon and return Thursday.

Whenever these guns are fired all the windows in the different buildings have to be opened to keep them from breaking.

Sarah Landis was born in August, 1843 in Iowa, and crossed the plains with her parents Abraham and Amanda Landis, 11 years later. They settled near Eugene at the confluence of the Willamette and McKenzie rivers, where the family home was a landmark for more than half a century.

Sarah Landis was married September 10, 1863, at the old home to F. M. Davis. They were engaged in farming near Eugene for many years. Their children are living: Mrs. Julietta Davies, Seattle; Mrs. Hattie Lincoln, Portland; and Dr. E. Davis, Monmouth. Her husband died in 1887.

Mrs. Davis was married to J. F. Hagar, a Civil War veteran. He died in 1921. She has lived in Monmouth since 1884 where her home is a place of delightful interest to those interested in choice antiques and quaint keepsakes.
