"Lack of equipment for the musical department influences the work of artist performers," Miss Tartar points out. The state music tournament, she says, showed Salem high school students lacking in musical atmosphere.

A number of new books of unusual interest have just been added to Salem public library shelves, according to Miss Maud M. Covington, librarian. Among them are books for children as well as adult readers.

"Two Living and One Dead," a novel by Sigurd Christensen, is a first choice book in Scandinavian countries.

Life on the island of Molokai, leper colony, is described in "Samaritans of Molokai" written by Charles J. Dutton.

George Dillon's Pulitzer prize poem, "Flowering Stones," have just been received at the library.

Among the novels are "State Fair" by Phil Stong and "Saints and Sinners" by Gamaliel Bradford. Gertrude Atherton's tales of her profession, "Adventures of a Novelist" is said to be interesting reading.

A new biography is "Albert, the Good" by Hector Bolitho. Albert was the wife of Queen Victoria of England.

More solutions of the "depression" are suggested by Ives Whitling Baker in "Pathways to Prosperity."

Emerson Fiedler's new book, "I See Religion" and Cornelius Brogan's biography, "Jason Lee," are books just received here. For the children there are two new books, "What Time is It?" and "Black and White" by M. Hill, author of the "Russian Primer."

One of the largest summer schools ever held in Salem district is now in progress. Over 400 boys and girls in grades one to six are enrolled in the two sections, at Grant and Park schools, according to Supervisor Carlotta Crowley.

To handle the large number of pupils, extra critic teachers have been added. At present the facilities consist of 15 critics and 15 student teachers. The summer school will run until the third week in July.

BERGSEVICK CASE TO BE ARGUED TODAY

Circuit Judge Lowelling today will hear arguments on the demurrer in the case brought by Lars Bergsevik, Salem lawyer, to enjoin Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, and Rufus O. Holman, state treasurer, from paying certain claims presented by Barnett Goldstein, for his services as special prosecutor in numerous actions launched by the state corporation department.

Special reference was made in Bergsevik's complaint to the several cases involving former offi-

cials and directors of the Empire Holding company.

Judge Lowelling set July 13, and 13 as the dates for hearing the case of Greene against the state tax commission, involving the validity of the state intangibles tax law.

Grass on Vacant Lots is Removed

Vacant lot owners who have been warned to clear their property of grass and undergrowth are generally complying with the order. City Engineer Rogers announced yesterday. To date, 30 lots had been posted.

Complaints about grass-grown lots about the city are being received daily by Rogers.

RELIEF SETUP HERE NOT TO BE CHANGED

Emergency construction along federal aid highway and national highways is embraced in one provision of the emergency relief bill now before the senate, Senator Charles L. McNary informed Gov. Julius L. Meier by telephone this week.

He informed the chief executive that the appeal for federal relief drafted Monday in Portland, was read in open session Tuesday in the senate at Washington. The Oregon message carried approval of the state unemployment committee of federal aid for relief of distress this fall and winter.

Excerpts from McNary's telegram read: "Keep the senate in session late Monday and many provisions of the bill were discussed. In my opinion the adoption of this measure providing federal aid for road construction will be of considerable benefit to Oregon. There is much opposition to this provision from members of congress representing eastern states."

Higher Postage On Letters Not Yet Necessary

Although the increased postal rates are not yet in effect, a noticeable number of letters bear-

ing three-cent stamps have been mailed at the local postoffice, Assistant Postmaster Gifford reported yesterday. The new rates do not go into effect until July 8.

Chief rate increases are letters, from two to three cents, and airmail, from five to eight cents for the first ounce, and 10 to 13 cents per additional ounce.
