

40TH BIRTHDAY HUGE SUCCESS

Many Former Members and
Pastors Come for Lu-
theran Event

SILVERTON, June 27.—"Trinity church is the open door to an unending friendship—that of our Lord," was Dr. O. A. Tinglestad's topic at the reunion of the confirmation classes of Trinity Lutheran church held at Silverton in connection with the observance of the 40th year anniversary Sunday. Dr. Tinglestad, who is now president of Pacific Lutheran college, at Parkland, Wash., was a member of the third confirmation class of the church. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Bernt Tinglestad, were honored Sunday, together with Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kloster, as charter members of the church. "We make friends in confirmation, but there is just one friend who never fails us. "One of the last things I look part in here," Rev. Mr. White said, "was the 25th anniversary observance of the church. Now another 15 years have gone by. Let us walk on, keeping our eyes on Christ until the final reunion." Rev. Mr. White particularly mentioned his regret, and expressing the regret of all present, that the Rev. Mr. White's leaving. Mrs. Pederson is the widow of the Trinity's first resident pastor. She is now 86 years old.

He reported that his father had had another relapse about a month ago but at the present time was improving and the children hoped to see him on the coast within another month.

Rev. H. Rogen of Monitor and Rev. A. Kraabel of Portland, and Rev. V. M. Jensen of Immanuel at Silverton brought the greetings of their congregations.

At 8 o'clock in the evening, the Rev. M. A. Christensen of Astoria told the story of "The Oberammergau," as seen by an American. Rev. W. Christensen and Mrs. Christensen attended the Passion play two years ago.
