NOBLE FINDS WEST WEATHERING STORM

Adjustment to Conditions is Made More Readily Here He Tells Chamber

The west is meeting present unpleasant conditions and adjusting itself to them much better than the east and New York, Clarence Noble, Skyline orchard owner who returned a few weeks ago from New York, declared at the chamber of commerce luncheon session yesterday noon. This was the final luncheon meeting of that body until fall.

Mr. Noble pointed to the manner in which this area is adjusting prices of produce to the times, and in turn labor costs to buying and selling figures, thus giving the working man some independence and freedom from charity. He contrasted the labor situation in New York, where the average man refuses to work for less than 40 cents an hour, and failing to get it, exhausts his savings and then throws himself upon charity.

People of the west are fortunate, too, that they are not so involved in the stock market as the New Yorker. Even the metropolis bootblack has brought and lost on stock, Noble said, and everyone who played with stock has lost, until the rich are poor.

Stock speculation in New York has been closely rivaled by real estate speculation, with the result that when the market broke, men who held a nominal ownership in of only 5 per cent of the last price, he said.

Financing real estate improvement bonds has also brought financial wrecks to some, mortgage bonds when issued on such projects being worth as much as 1.2 times the whole value of the building. Receivables are common for hotels and office buildings, he said. With high finance overhead, rents cannot be lowered, and with rents maintained, people cannot pay them, and as a result the apartment vacancy averages 25 per cent.

As the result of his findings in the east, Mr. Noble urged conservatism in business and made an appeal for every business man and individual citizen to pay his personal obligations. "For we can't have prosperity before these obligations are paid off," he declared.

HEWITT CLAN WILL CONVENE SATURDAY

The descendants of Henry and Elizabeth Hewitt will meet for their 14th annual reunion Saturday, July 2. As has been the custom in the past, this gathering will be held on a portion of the old donation land claim in Yamhill county.

Mr. and Mrs. Hewitt came to Oregon in 1842, crossing the plains with their team of oxen. They drove the first wagon down the eastern slope of the Blue mountains, and the second into The Dalles.

There are four sons of this family living. They are: Matthew C. Hewitt of Roseville, California; Dr. Jasper L. Hewitt and Dr. Lorin L. Hewitt of Portland, and Harry W. Hewitt of Independence, Oregon.

TOWNSEND STATUS NOT YET SETTLED

Whether or not Watson Townsend will be compelled to resign as an alderman on Salem's city council is still an undetermined matter. Townsend was asked several weeks ago by the state highway department to discontinue all connection with city politics.

He promptly prepared his resignation from the council but did not submit it when the council convened, having received notice in the meanwhile that the department's order was being reconsidered. Recently the department informed Townsend, according to advice received by this paper, that its order was being held in abeyance pending a final decision.

Townsend, meanwhile, is proceeding with his work on the council. He is chairman of the airport committee which is now considering an alternate lease to the one proposed to the council last Monday night and referred back to the committee.

How to combat the operation of heavy trucks on the state highways without injuring the logging industry, is the outstanding problem to be considered at a meeting to be held here Friday under the direction of the state highway commission.

Log haulers and logging operators from all sections of Oregon have promised to attend the session. A similar meeting was held in Salem three months ago, when log hauling operations were considered. Members of the highway commission have contended that logging operations have been responsible for breaking down many of the highways, and that some action must be taken to remedy the present unsatisfactory conditions.

WILLIAM HAMMOND, head of the automobile drivers license bureau of the department of state, was rushed to the Salem General hospital yesterday with an acute attack of appendicitis. Hammond returned from Seaside Sunday night and was stricken early in the morning. He's hoping for a fast recovery, Bill.

Oswald West, former governor of Oregon, was at the capitol yesterday and announced victory in the first hurdle for his stage and truck initiative. He filed completed petitions with 20,466 names, insuring its appearance on the November ballot, along with a lot of other measures.

Rufus Holman, state treasurer, returned from a weekend at the beach with such a sunburn he was unable to shave yesterday. While at the beach Holman purchased the 15-room Cannon Beach hotel. He says he will remodel it into summer homes and have it ready for occupancy before the season gets well under way.
