

Junior Ball Homecoming Game at 5:15 Today at Olinger

BOTH OLD GRAD TEAMS COMING

Orville Schwab Joins old Mates for Game; 1931 Lads Also to Play

"Pitching, Schwab, Catching, Rudislaus." That announcement made by umpires at Vaughn street in Portland, at Baker and at Colorado Springs late in the summer of 1930 as three American Legion Junior baseball championship games were to start, will be echoed this afternoon at 5:15 on Olinger field where it also has been heard before.

Figuring that a return engagement of the 1930 northwest champion Legion Junior team without Orville Schwab on the mound would be like Hamlet with Banquo's ghost left out, fans who still thrill at recollection of that team's triumphs prevailed upon Orville to drop his work in Portland long enough to be here today for the first annual Marion county American Legion Junior homecoming.

The "old grads" of junior ball in this county are to play the Woodburn team, 1932 champion outfit. While the 1930 Silverton team which won the northwest title will be on hand intact, the 1931 team will also be there practically 100 per cent, including two lads who will be playing with Woodburn.

May be Couple of Five-Inning Games

All of these ex-junior players will get in there, even if there have to be two five-inning games. It is announced by Oliver B. Huston, manager of the 1931 county team and originator of the homecoming idea. If all the boys get here, the 1930 team may play one game and the 1931 champs the other, against Woodburn.

Huston reports that delegations of fans from all over the county will attend today's game, accompanying the players from various communities who figured on those two successful teams of past years.

In addition to its value as a re-convening of the outstanding ball players who won honors for this county, placing emphasis on the junior ball program just as another county champion team is heading into the outside competition for state honors, the game was planned as an aid to the Woodburn American Legion post in financing its campaign for the district race and inter-district competition if it wins the district title.

To that end, all services for the game have been furnished free of charge. Referee, umpires and Jesse Deets are donating their services as umpires, Harold Hauk volunteered to put the diamond in shape and the Welder laundry is furnishing the towels.

FOR the first time in many years a baseball trade has kicked-up a rumpus in a major league circuit. And that trade was the one which brought the youthful pitching star, Dan MacFayden, to the New York Yankees. Squawks have come from Detroit, Washington and Philadelphia, for the baseball men and fans of those cities believe the acquisition of MacFayden gives the Yankees a bit of an edge in the pennant race.

The Yankee pitching staff, they believe, was strong enough to win or make the pennant race a close battle all the way, before the deal for MacFayden was put through. Now they feel that the balance of power is a bit one-sided. The teams of all three cities had their eyes on the respected right hander of the Boston Red Sox. Clark Griffith and Connie Mack already had put in bids for the young man.

To get MacFayden the Yankees had to part with Henry Johnson,

long a member of the Yankee hurling staff, and Paul Andrews, and it is reported, a goodly sum of cold cash. Johnson, feeling that his trade to the Boston Red Sox was unfair to him after his long service with the Yanks, refused to go to Boston. He left for his home in Florida and announced that he would stay there indefinitely, or until the Yankee management reconsidered his case. However the rules in trades make it necessary for him to obey or remain out of organized baseball.

The acquisition of MacFayden, despite his rather poor showing with the Red Sox this season, undoubtedly makes the Yankee hurling staff the strongest in the American circuit. The youthful right hander long had ambitions to become a Yankee and he will work like a beaver to make good. Being with a hard-hitting, winning combination this latter may not be so difficult a task.

Another factor in the apparent Yankee domination of the American League race is the play of Tony Lazzeri, the wallowing second-baseman. Tony is playing brilliantly around the keystone post and Manager McCarthy, who not so long ago thought of giving Lazzeri and Earl Combs for MacFayden, is probably thanking his lucky star that he didn't go through with the deal at that time. Tony, thought to be through last year, has made a comeback that smacks of real baseball genius. He is batting at a .380 clip and leads the Yanks in triples.

Lazzeri, warming a bench the better part of last season and forced to listen to the condescendence of his mates and rumors that he would not be a member of the Yanks much longer, never gave up hope. "I'm in a terrible slump," he said, "but I'll come back!" And he has, with a vengeance.

It begins to look like a Yankee year.

Having looked over his boys in spring practice, Locey reports he has a backfield just as good as the one that cavorted for him at Olympic club last fall but his line will be light, the biggest tackle weighing only 175. On top of that Denver U. teams have been in-and-outers for the past few seasons and Locey will have a job building some dependability and morale.

Denver U. is in the Rocky Mountain conference, playing University of Colorado, Colorado College, Colorado Teachers, Colorado Aggie and University of Utah. It has non-conference games this fall with U. of Kansas at Colorado Mines, and with Temple University at Philadelphia.

The big achievement of Locey's Olympic club team last fall was a victory over St. Mary's, the school that for a time threatened to be among the nationally undefeated list. St. Mary's totaled minus 41 yards against Olympic club, failing to make a first down.

Some of the credit for that goes to our ex-Willamette center, Nick Bican, who played that position for Locey on the Olympic club team and then, tossed into the All-West team as a tackle when some big stars failed to report, turned in a great performance against some All-American-mentioned gent.
