DETROIT, June 30—(AP)—The seventeenth annual convention of Kiwanis international stood adjourned today after election of trustees.

Trustees elected to the international board for two years included: Isaac P. McNabb, Peterborough, Ont.; Dr. William J. Carrington, Atlantic City, N. J.; Harper Gattton, Madisonville, Ky.; James M. Lynch, Florence, S. C.; Curry Watson, Lincoln, Neb.; and Alfred C. Allen, Urbana, Ill.

Ernest F. McGregor, Norwalk, Conn., was elected for one year to fill the board vacancy created by the resignation of Carl E. Endicott, Huntington, Ind., following his election as president.

A resolution approving a program to aid unemployment in the urban areas by removing families to small rural tracts, where they might become self-supporting, was approved.

The 151st convention will be held in Los Angeles.

Woolery Trial | Jury is Chosen

BAKER, Ore., June 30—(AP)—The jury which is to try Clarence Woolery, 14, on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the slaying last March of his foster mother, Mrs. Frank Garlock, was completed late today. The jurors are all men.

The jury went to Auburn to view the scene of Mrs. Garlock's death. The taking of testimony will start tomorrow.

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NANKING PROPOSES PACT WITH SOVIET

MOSCOW, June 30—(AP)

The Nanking government has proposed a non-aggression pact with the soviet government and renewal of diplomatic relations. It was officially announced today.

A perfunctory official announcement said Wang Tsung Sze, head of the special Chinese mission to Moscow had made the proposal after a series of interviews with officials of the commissariat of foreign affairs.

The communique did not disclose the soviet attitude toward the proposal, but it was held in well-informed circles here there was no reason to suppose the Kremlin would not consent.

The soviet union, however, may consider it necessary to proceed cautiously with any alliance of this nature in order not to disturb its peaceful relations with Japan, Chinese circles expected an answer shortly.

One Negro Kills Another; Police Told of Quarrel

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 30—(AP)—Joe Daniels, 16-year-old bootblack character known here as "hot shot" Joe, tonight shot and killed T. C. Williams,

27, another negro, following an argument which police said involved Daniels' wife.

Police said Mrs. Daniels had instigated the argument by accusing Williams of conspiring with a negro to rob a white man. They said they were told Williams threatened Mrs. Daniels with a chair, then was shot twice by Daniels.

The slaying took place in Klamath Falls "restricted" negro district.

DALLAS DROPS 9-8 GAME TO NEWBERG

DALLAS, June 30—(Special)—Newberg captured the odd game of a three-game series with Dallas here today by a 9 to 8 score. Dallas won its only game of the series on the Newberg field.

Dallas was leading by a score of 7 to 5 at the beginning of the ninth inning when Newberg came back strong to cross the plate four times. Two costly errors by the Dallas infield at this point accounted for three runs. The biggest inning for Dallas was the fourth in which 3 runs were scored.

LOOK TO AMERICA FOR DEBT RELIEF

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, June 30—(AP)—The question whether America will forgive and forget war debts became prominent tonight as delegates to the Lausanne reparations conference again found themselves face to face with deadlock.

An official French spokesman said Premier Edouard Herriot had decided the interdependence of reparations and war debts must be maintained and he would accept no settlement unless it contained a clause safeguarding France against the possibility the United States might refuse to reconsider the war debts issue.

Germany continued her part to the deadlock by turning down a French suggestion she deposit a six billion mark (about \$1,500,000,000) bond with the world bank in lieu of reparations annuities. This deposit would be made pending negotiations for a new debt agreement with the United States.

Oregon Mutual Company Shows Business Gains

Business in the Oregon Mutual Fire Insurance company of McMinnville increased \$1,143,634 in gross policies placed on the books during the last fiscal year, Anderson & Rupert, local agents, reported here yesterday. On the books at the close of business May 31, 1932, was a total of \$18,439,855 in policies written compared to \$17,004,349 at the same period the previous year. Fire losses for the first five months of 1932 decreased \$58,544 from the loss total in the first five months of 1931. L. M. Waughman, secretary of the company, released the figures.
