Federation Interests Local B. & P. W. Club

Of interest to the local business and professional women's club is the news from the national board of directors meeting held in Milwaukee, Wis., recently.

The Biennial Convention of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs will be held in Chicago, July 9 to 15, 1932, it was announced. Mrs. Pearl Warwick of Champaign and Chicago, former president of the Illinois Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs and director of the Women's Department of the Household Finance Corporation in Chicago, will be the general chairman. The hotel events have been designated as convention headquarters.

Since the Chicago World's Fair—The Century of Progress Exposition—will be in progress at the time of the convention, an unusually large attendance is being invited. The board of directors is inviting the International Federation of Business and Professional Women to hold its convention in Chicago next July and the latter will bring many distinguished foreign women to the United States.

Mrs. Warwick, the convention chairman, has had a business experience which admirably equips her for the management of such an enterprise as a large convention. She began her professional career as a bank cashier. Then in 1917 she was named state examiner of small loan companies in Illinois, the first woman in the United States to be appointed to such a position. In that capacity she had the supervision of 300 of these companies, representing an invested capital of \$30,000,000. Her present position as director of the Women's Department of the Household Finance Corporation gives her supervision of the training of 339 women employees in 125 offices, and she represents the interests of 250,000 women clients. She is therefore well qualified to handle both the mechanics and finances of the convention.

For the past two years, Mrs. Warwick has been a member of the finance committee of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs.

Mrs. Lauterman Given Unusual 4th Surprise

Mrs. John H. Lauterman was the victim of a complete surprise on the Fourth of July when her husband took her to their farm on the Rickreall creek at Ellendale and she found a company of 20 assembled in her honor, and a summer home completely built and furnished and named "Mazie-dell" as a gift to her by her husband.

The house stands in a clump of oak and fir trees on the bench over the creek on the right bank of the Rickreall, just below the bridge. It is across the creek and a little upstream from the historic Nesmith store and home, now the summer home of her brother, R. P. Boise.

A bountiful dinner was served on a long table under the trees. After the dinner Dr. Carl G. Donay served as toastmaster in an informal program in which he called on all present to make some remarks. Interesting historical reminiscences were called to mind by R. J. Hendricks and R. P. Boise. Mrs. Frank Snedecor read from a letter written by one of Sen. Nesmith's daughters, respecting the naming of the creek. Later the guests wandered about the place inspecting its primitive beauty.

On the return they stopped at the venerable Nesmith home which has been reconstructed by Mr. Boise as near after its original design as possible. Ellendale is a historic spot, for here were located the Nesmith flour mills, the second on the west side of the Willamette, and the farthest south, which supplied flour for the miners of California and southern Oregon; and the woolen mills which operated for six years until destroyed by fire in 1871.

REPARATIONS ISSUE NEARS SETTLEMENT

Germany Asked to put up Four Billion Marks Bond Security

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, July 4.—(AP)—Germany was under heavy pressure today to accept a plan for settlement of reparations with a provision linking it with debts due the United States from the world war allies.

But the reparations conference marked time awaiting the return from Paris of Premier Herriot. Chancellor von Papen of Germany told Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain that it was impossible to do anything at all here with the French premier absent.

Mr. MacDonald was understood to have agreed to wait, but he demanded that the whole matter be cleared up by Thursday, for on Thursday night he intends to go back to London. M. Herriot, it was announced, will arrive early tomorrow.

The plan is to have Germany put up a bond of 4,000,000,000 marks with the world bank, part of it to be in lieu of reparations payments and the rest as Germany's contribution to economic reconstruction of Europe.

Originally this proposal contained a clause making cancellation of the reparations conditional upon cancellation by the United States of the debts due from the allies. This Chancellor von Papen rejected last week.

In its present form the clause is phrased differently to provide for a "gentlemen's agreement" that the plan shall not become effective until the American attitude on the debts question has been determined.

A German counter proposal, it was reported, is that she put up 2,000,000,000 marks in cash, payable in 10 installments beginning in 1937. This would be her maximum contribution to reconstruction and would take the place of the proposed bond. The other powers appeared inclined not to regard this seriously.

TARIFF UPON IRISH GOODS IS FAVORED

LONDON, July 4.—(AP)—The British government moved today to impose a tariff up to 100 per cent on imports from the Irish Free State, and her policy was supported by a margin of 278 votes in the first test before the house of commons.

The tariff proposal was submitted to parliament in retaliation of Eamon de Valera's refusal to pay the semi-annual install-
