Six-Year-old boy Looks at Most of Them; Missing Entire Afternoon

SILVERTON, July 7 — While on a recent trip to the Silver Creek Falls State park, Mr. and Mrs. Alf O. Nelson spent the afternoon hunting for their youngest son, six-year-old Jimmy. But Jimmy spent the afternoon in carrying out the purpose for which he had come to the falls country—that is, viewing the various waterfalls of the park.

Jimmy disappeared during the noon picnic. Mr. and Mrs. Nelson did not notice his disappearance from the table at once but shortly afterwards they noticed that he was gone. Then the search began. It lasted until shortly before sundown. Other visitors at the falls assisted in the search. Finally the little chap came walking from the highway, met Mrs. Ernest Palmer, who had assisted in the search, and asked her to tell him where "Mrs. Nelson" was. Mrs. Palmer led the little fellow to his distracted parents at once.

Jimmy tells that he became tired of sitting at the table and decided to have a look about the grounds, so he left the picnic grounds, and followed a stranger to him, who set out over the trails to visit the various falls. Toward the close of the afternoon, he became tired and saw a path which he thought might be a shortcut to the picnic grounds, so he followed and took the path, which instead of leading him to the grounds led him out to the highway about half way between the South and the North Falls. Jimmy was not at all worried or frightened seemingly, but had greatly enjoyed the afternoon.

BIDS FOR HIGHWAY WORK ARE INVITED

Bids for road improvements aggregating an estimated expenditure of approximately \$77,000 will be considered at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland May 20. It was announced at the state highway department Thursday.

Probably the most important improvements to be considered involve the Vancouver section of the Oregon-Washington highway and the Nye-Laziska ranch section of the Pendleton-John Day highway.

Other projects for which bids will be received follow:

Jennings Lodge section of the East Portland-Oregon City highway, involving approximately .75 of a mile.

Holdredge section of secondary highway No. 154, involving .65 of a mile in Yamhill county.

Clean and paint structural steel on bridge over the Columbia river at Vancouver.

Bridge over Juniper canyon and half viaduct near the same location on the Columbia river highway, about 15 miles east of Umatilla.

Bad Investment Reduces Estate Of Emma Miller

Unfortunate investments, primarily in holding company stocks, reduced materially the estate of the late Emma Miller, an inventory filed yesterday in probate court here revealed. Personal property, largely notes due to the deceased, was listed at a total value of \$4717 and real property was listed at \$1750.

One-half interest in 470 shares of the seven per cent preferred stock of the Prudential Bancorporation was listed as of no value. A value of \$12 was assigned by the appraisers to a one-half interest in six shares of Central Public Service corporation stock. A one-half interest in 12 shares of \$100 seven per cent National Trust company stock was listed at a total value of \$5.

Appraisers of the estate were Myrtle E. Thomas, J. F. Richards, Walter W. Miller.

MUSICAL PROGRAM PLEASES AUDIENCE

Pupils and Chorus Taught By Prof. Hobson Show Unusual Ability

An unusually beautiful musical program broke the early summer calm Thursday night at Nelson hall. Although it was presented for the most part by students in voice, yet it had a character and continuity that kept the interest of the large audience which packed the hall.

It was presented by the students of Prof. E. W. Hobson, and assisting were Dibert Jepson, talented young violinist, and the Salem Madrigal club and the Salem civic male chorus, the latter two directed by Prof. Hobson.

A keynote of Norwegian music was developed with compositions of Grieg given preference. The result was a group of stories in song, each sung with commendable understanding and a clear enunciation which allowed the audience to follow the lovely themes developed by the songs. "A Swan" (Grieg) was sung with unusual charm and dramatic sensitiveness by Miss Ruth Bedford, a student who has not been studying voice for a great length of time. "Page's Road Song," as sung by Herbert Hobson, was also delightfully interpreted. "There are Fairies at the Bottom of Our Garden," a delightfully imaginative song poem, was nicely expressed by Lucile Miles. The work of the advanced students of Prof. Hobson, among them Ronald Craven, Wendell Robinson and Lillian Scott, was presented in serious and artistic manner.

Excellent transition, dramatic feel, and deft nuances marked the work of the students Thursday night. There was lacking at times a dramatic firmness in expression which resulted in a flow of song almost too soft and smooth, to be musical. With younger students though, a greater strength perhaps should not be expected.

A pleasing solo supported by the male chorus was that sung by Everett Craven of Portland, "The Vast Unnumbered Throng" by Grieg. The Salem Madrigal group was especially pleasing in "The Sleight." This song made a perfect complement to the Norwegian theme of the program.

The Madrigal club is developing into an excellent singing organization. The soprano section has enough high voices to carry through without strain. Unusual on it may seem, the alto section of this group could be successfully augmented with more low voices.

The Thursday night program in all was one to be highly commended; original in theme, excellently balanced, and for a student recital uniformly well presented.

The work of young Dalbert Jepson, violinist, was a high spot on the program both technically and musically.

Occurrences and Goals at the center of Oregon's state government

It looked like the voters would have 13 measures upon which to act at the November election in addition to the long list of national, state, county, district and city officials. Filing of petitions closed yesterday and late in the afternoon 13 had been completed and assured places on the ballot.

And among these was the consolidation bill. With about 25,000 signatures on these petitions, meaning that either a miracle occurred following the alleged theft of 20,000 signatures several days ago, or the theft was "staged" in order to stimulate more signatures and thus secure sufficient signatures.

Whatever the case, and there are many who will never believe the "theft" story, the consolidation measure will be on the ballot and there will be a bitter campaign waged between now and November 5. Sponsors of the measure have spent a lot of money, donated from someplace, in order to create one state university at Corvallis.

In order to prevent further "robberies," the petitions were brought to Salem in relays of about 7,000 each, with a deputy sheriff of the county from whence they were brought, accompanying each carload. About 25 men were around the secretary of state's office to see that they were all filed.

The three measures comprising the governor's tax program were likewise filed during the afternoon with about 25,000 signatures on each. The other two of the six initiatives, to be on the ballot, which do not include the three constitutional amendments referred to by the legislature, are the truck and bus bill and the repeal of the state dry law.

Herbert Gordon, member of the last legislature and a candidate for speaker of the house at the next session, was a visitor at the capitol yesterday. He came down to see the governor, only to learn that he was in Portland. Governor Meier returned to his home late Wednesday night after a long session at the executive offices.

From all indications it appears as though there will be no quarterly licenses issued by Oregon this year. The executive department has run up against stone wall in its attempt to take the matter out of Hoss' hands and the state law has tied Hoss' hands. So that's that.
