MONTANA PEOPLE PICK HOME HERE

KEIZER, July 7—Mr. and Mrs. Harvey R. Hansen with their children, Robert and Irene of Dulton, Montana, 40 miles northwest of Great Falls, are soon to become residents of Keizer. Mr. Hansen has an extensive wheat grower, but tiring of the extreme climatic conditions, he decided in 1929 to seek a new location.

Since that time they have traveled thousands of miles through California, Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois, Delaware, Florida and Oregon. After getting literature from Salem descriptive of the beautiful Willamette valley, they decided to make Oregon their home.

GERVAIS, July 7—Mrs. Theresa Schlechter, 67, died Tuesday morning at the home of her son, Anton, at Mt. Angel following a paralytic stroke which she suffered Monday. The funeral service was held from St. Joseph's church here Thursday morning. Rev. Father Walsh officiating and burial was at the Catholic cemetery east of town.

Mrs. Schlechter was born and married in Hungary. The family came to the United States in 1907 and settled in Portland. In 1914 they came here, buying the farm east of town now owned by J. C. Tedder. They later moved into Gervais. Mrs. Schlechter died in 1932.

Four sons, Joseph and Peter of Gervais, Anton of Mt. Angel, Andrew of Suver, and one daughter, Mrs. Theresa Stravens of Gervais and 17 grandchildren survive. A daughter, Sister Armathea died in Roumania last December.
