

GARNER INSISTS ON LOANS TO PERSONS

WASHINGTON, July 8.—(AP)—A democratic attempt to compromise on an unemployment relief bill that would receive President Hoover's signature collapsed today through Speaker Garner's insistence upon a provision for loans to individuals.

As a result leaders predicted tonight the \$2,100,000,000 bill would be sent to the president probably tomorrow to receive an almost certain veto.

Garner, the democratic vice presidential nominee, refused to compromise with senate democrats, as he had previously declined to yield to President Hoover.

The new effort to seek a compromise from Garner was made by a committee of three democratic senators appointed by a conference of the senate minority earlier.

TOLEDO MAN SLAIN BY FLEEING BANDIT

TOLEDO, O., July 8.—(AP)—A fugitive gunman involved in the slaying of Marshal Jay Davis at North Baltimore today, shot and seriously wounded Dr. Martin Larkin, 34, prominent Toledo physician, tonight in a wild attempt to escape from this city, where he had fled after the killing of Davis.

Police identified the gunman, who fled on foot after shooting the doctor, through the description of three youths whom he kidnapped in his earlier flight from North Baltimore.

An accomplice of the fugitive, who was wounded probably fatally by Marshal Davis, said the fleeing man was James Wilson of New York. The wounded accomplice gave his own name as Bert Storey, 19, of St. Paul, Minn.

Possibility that Wilson kidnapped John Hova of Toledo, and the latter's in-year-old son, shortly after Dr. Larkin was wounded, was the next development.

Mrs. L. S. Barnes Dies Suddenly on Trip to Her Home

Telegrams were received here Thursday announcing the sudden death of Mrs. L. S. Barnes at Wilits, Calif., while she was en route to her home at Beverly Hills, after spending two weeks visiting with friends and relatives in Salem and Portland.

Mrs. Barnes before her marriage was Miss Grace Dinmore. She was reared in Salem, where when four years old. Her only sister, Mrs. Thomas Burrows lived in Salem prior to her marriage and removal to Portland a few months ago.

Besides her sister, Mrs. Barnes is survived by two brothers, Del Dinmore of Portland and W. L. Dinmore of California.

Protest Raised Against Cherry Inspectors Here

Black cherry shippers and growers in the Salem vicinity Thursday protested against regulations which they allege are being enforced here by federal inspectors.

It was charged that the inspectors have failed to advise the shippers on the floor of the canneries whether or not they are complying with the federal requirements as to spray tolerance but tell the shippers if they do not meet such requirements the cars will be condemned when they pass over the state line.

Other equally serious grievances were voiced by the growers and shippers.

JOY OF GOLD SALVAGERS MARRED BY WRIT



COUNTING AND DRYING RUPEES. Successful in their four-year battle with the sea in efforts to reach the strongroom of the sunken liner Egypt, the crew of the salvage ship Artiglio were treated to an unpleasant surprise on arriving with their first load of recovered gold at Plymouth, England. The treasure which the salvagers had wrested from Old Man Neptune was placed under arrest following the filing of a claim by a French fisheries company that participated in one of the many attempts to locate the Egypt some years ago. But the writ doesn't apply to the Artiglio and the salvage ship is free to continue its work raising the remainder of the bullion, \$5,000,000 in all, pending the court decision on the suit. On board the salvage vessel during the diving operations were Captain Oliver Beck, representative of the insurance assessors, the real owners of the Egypt's gold, and Commander Quaglia, head of the salvage expedition run by the Italian Sorima Company. Captain Beck and Commander Quaglia keep tally of the recovered treasure for their employers, for according to the agreement salvagers and insurance company go "fifty-fifty." It was a strange sight to see the crew of the Artiglio, under Captain Carl, work like bees on the deck of the ship, counting and drying out thousands of Indian rupee notes. However, the paper money was forgotten when the gold began to arrive from Davey Jones' locker. The first load of bullion is valued at \$875,000, the Artiglio's share of which will cover all expenses to date. The gold is in bars and English sovereigns. The liner Egypt sunk in 1922 off Pointe du Nez, near Brest. It took the salvagers three years to find her and three more to break into her strongroom.

ROCKEFELLER HAS ANOTHER BIRTHDAY

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., July 8.—(AP)—John D. Rockefeller was 93 years old today and he recognized it quietly as betis a country gentleman who expects to live to be a hundred.

He permitted few deviations in his daily schedule except to acknowledge the greetings of the staff on his estate.

He arose at 8 to eat a breakfast of fruit juice and cereal. At 9 he took a stroll about the grounds. At 10 he started a few holes of golf. At 11:30 he returned to the house, exhilarated by the balminess of the weather.

In the afternoon he went for a drive on public roads, although he might have ridden 33 miles on his own property without meeting another automobile. He came back early to welcome his guests.

Tonight he presided at an informal family dinner. Around him were grouped John D. Rockefeller Jr., his five sons, John D. 111, Lawrence, Winthrop, David and Nelson, the last with his wife, his daughter Abby, her husband David A. Milton and their four-year-old daughter.

Wide Territory Won by Chinese

HARBIN, Manchuria, July 8.—(AP)—Huge slices of northeastern Manchuria were reported today to have fallen into the hands of Chinese irregulars recently.

The irregulars have captured seven steamers plying the Sungari river between Harbin and the Russian border, including the first class passenger boat "Harbin."

St. Pierre Suit Nearing Climax

LOS ANGELES, July 8.—(AP)—David L. Hutton, baritone voiced husband of Almee Semple McPherson, today heard himself described variously as a "philandering peacemaker" and a "much maligned young man" by attorneys who concluded arguments in Myrtle St. Pierre's \$200,000 breach of promise trial.

BEER IS LEGAL. LINCOLN, Neb., July 8.—(AP)—The right of Nebraska to keep in their homes "reasonable" amounts of intoxicating liquor for "personal use and needs," was upheld today by the Nebraska supreme court. Enforcement authorities had contended that liquor acquired after May 1, 1917, when the state prohibition law went into effect, was illegal. The case before the court involves 69 pints of beer.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—(AP)—One hundred thousand dollars was available tonight to take members of the bonus army back home.

President Hoover late today signed the bill appropriating the money. He had suggested that the step be taken to disperse the thousands of ex-service men here and congress rushed it through yesterday.

The measure would provide transportation for each certified veteran of the World war, on a subsistence of 75 cents a day. The money would be a loan, however, to be paid back from future bonus payments.

through the years. "It already is admitted that the tax bill fails to balance the budget by \$150,000,000. We counted as cash the \$229,000,000 owed us this year.

"Therefore, it means that without further income losses there will be a deficit this year of \$419,000,000.

Representative Stafford (R., Wis.), said "The two great countries that negotiated the agreement are to be congratulated. They are making it possible for Germany to recover industrially."

FRUIT JUICE SALES CONTRACT IS MADE

H. S. Gile & Co. of Salem yesterday announced ratification of a factor agreement with Hugo Victor, factor of Portland, covering all their fruit juice business for their plant which is located at Woodburn.

The new arrangement entails a change in marketing of the juice pressed at the Woodburn plant, which this season will probably run about 50,000 gallons.

At the Woodburn juice plant, loganberry, strawberry, raspberry, cherry and blackberry juices are the main ones turned out.
