LICENSE RELIEF TO BE URGED FURTHER

A campaign will be launched here early this week to induce Governor Meier to call a special session of the legislature to amend the motor vehicle license law, or extend the 15-day moratorium on license payments to cover a period of a month or six weeks.

This information was received at the statehouse Saturday after the governor had announced that he virtually had abandoned his proposal for a quarterly installment payment plan, and had "washed his hands" of the entire license controversy.

Governor Meier will be advised that unless the moratorium is extended, or legislation is enacted providing for a quarterly installment payment plan, between 20,000 and 40,000 automobile owners in Oregon will not be able to operate their cars during the first quarter of the current license period.

The governor previously announced in a public statement that the people of Oregon were not in sympathy with the plea for a special legislative session either for consideration of the motor vehicle laws or for any other purpose. He has not intimated whether the 15-day moratorium will be extended.

LACK INSTRUCTIONS ON FURLOUGH PLAN

Just in what manner the annual 30-day furlough required by the newly approved government economy bill will affect the Salem postoffice is not yet known, Assistant Postmaster Gibbard said last night.

No instructions have been received from the comptroller at Washington, D. C.
If all of the local employees are forced to take the furlough, the equivalent of 1930 days' work will be lost each year. Including rural carriers and the custodian, as well as officers, city carriers and clerks, 65 men are employed at the local office.

The furlough, as instituted, may cause some difficulty in arrangements, since a number of postal employees already have taken vacation on pay. The furlough would be taken without remuneration.

MURDER CASES TO BE LATED, DECIDE

District Attorney John H. Carson announced yesterday that he would ask tomorrow that the cases of Robert Ripley, Frank Manning and Dupree Poe, under indictment for murder, be held up until a later date in the present term of court.

Carson conferred with Judge Fred Wilson of The Dalles who will preside at the trials and Wilson indicated the arrangement would be satisfactory with him.

The three men are held for the murder of Night Officer James Iverson of Silverton who was killed early on the morning of May 2, 1931.

Other cases affected by the postponement will be those of Harry Erpelting, charged with the murder of Lloyd Eddy, and B. F. Glesy and Zeno Schwab, ex-Aurora bankers, held for illegal use of funds in a loan concern they handled.

California Crew Wins, Qualifies

WORCESTER, Mass., July 9—(AP)—California's mighty crew put on one of the most stirring finishes in the history of rowing to nose out the Penn A. C., eight by only two feet today on Lake Quinsigamond's 2000-meter course.

This narrow margin was enough to qualify them as the United States representatives for the Olympic rowing at Long Beach, Cal., next month.

TESTA PLANNING ON MESSAGE TO OTHER PLANETS

NEW YORK, July 9—(AP)—Nicola Tesla is convinced that other planets are inhabited and intends to devote the rest of his life to "establishing intelligent communications between two planets."

The famous inventor will be 76 tomorrow, but his vitality is such that "I could climb a tree 100 feet tall right now."

He calls his present endeavor "establishment of distance" and said today "The transmission of energy to another planet is only a matter of engineering." He declared it to be "mathematically certain" other planets are inhabited.
