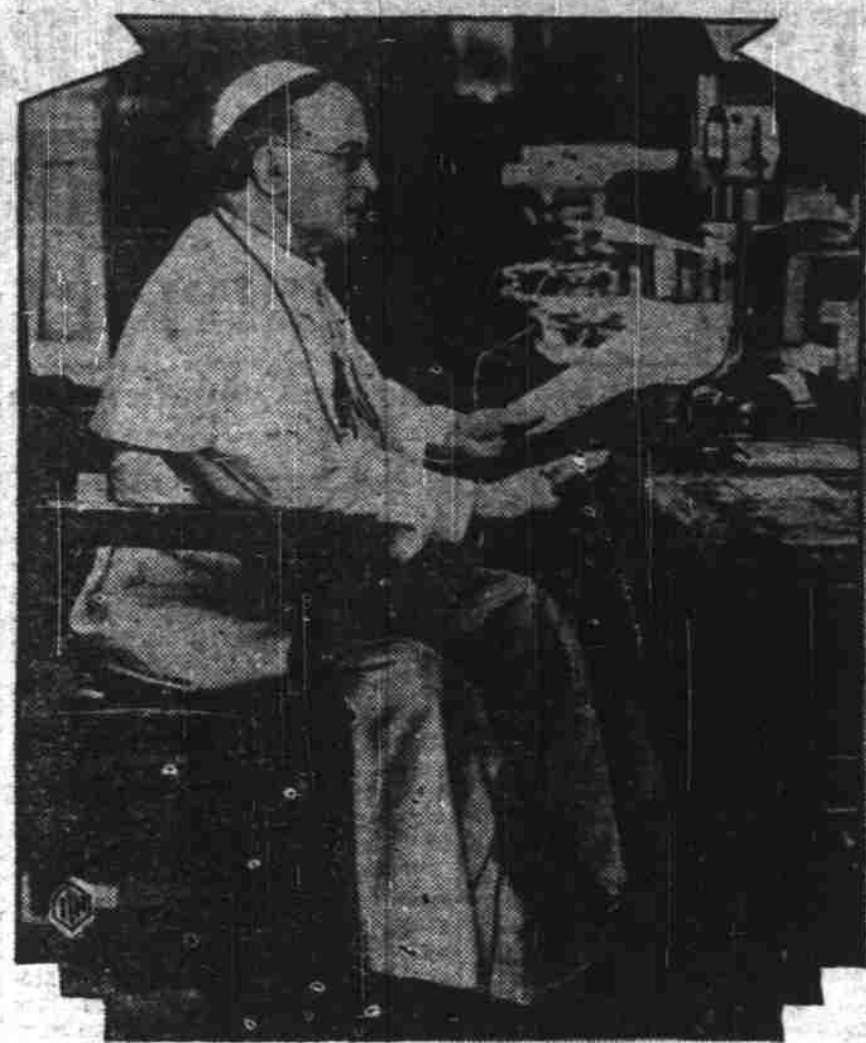
# CLAGGETT REUNION ATTENDED BY 100
