There was again a lack of price change in the local market for eggs. General conditions were unchanged. Receipts are about holding their own. While there was some talk of

price reduction by poultry buyers for the coming week, no changes were announced in values on hens for the day. Full steadiness is reflected for broilers. First peach plums of the season

in fair supply out of the Mayger section of the lower Columbia, Demand is reported favorable with sales around 12@12%c pound. Considerable activity is suggested in the market for loganberries, raspberries and blackcaps with prices steady to a trifle better in spots. Strawberries are scarce and

Rise Follows Wheat's Slump to all-Time **Bottom Record**

CHICAGO, July 15. - (AP) Sudden bulges in corn values rallied the grain markets today after wheat had collapsed to within % of the all-time bottom price record.

Reports that the Kansas corn crop was being hurt by dry hot weather were largely responsible for the action of corn. Wheat was bearishly influenced by domestic primary receipts much larger than week ago, with foreigners persistently minimizing purchases from North America, and by advices from both sides of the Canadian border that danger of black rust damage was daily becoming more remote.

Corn closed unsettled 14-76 above yesterday's finish, wheat unchanged to 1/4 higher, oats 1/4 off to 1/2 up.

NEW YORK, July 15 .- (AP)-Operations for the advance were resumed in today's stock market and found traders willing to par-

ticipate in a moderate mark-up. Some hesitation was evident early, but with activity getting progressively duller on the reaction efforts to turn the trend encountered little resistance. Tobacco shares started the rally which was joined in turn by rails, oils and other classifications. At the close several leaders were 1 to 3 points higher, but the average gain fell somewhat short of Wednesday's. Transactions totaled 816,940 shares.

With the market commodityconscious, it was apparent that renewed strength in cotton and steadiness of wheat after yesterday's sharp decline were factors, Also, Washington advices expressed assurance congress was soon to adjourn, bond quotation had an upward trend, and the weekly banking figures reflected improvement, so that the day's news was favorable.

American Telephone's earnings statement had little effect marketwise, the stock selling off 1% and rallying to close 1% to the good. Earnings for the first half failed to cover the present rate by 48 cents a share, but the statement also showed that subsidiaries' results in the second quarter were somewhat better than in the first.
