POLITICAL STORY NOW AT ELSINORE

"The Dark Horse" Appears
Today; Warren William
Has Leading Role

The first of the presidential year political films to reach the local screen, "The Dark Horse," which began a run at the Elsinore theatre with a preview last night, also has the distinction of being one of the finest comedy dramas since the advent of talking pictures.

It was produced by First National Pictures from an original screen story by an anonymous author and was directed by Alfred E. Green, who gave us "Union Depot," "The Rich Are Always With Us" and "It's Tough to Be Famous." Joseph Jackson and Courtney Terrett, two former newspapermen wrote the dialogue and the adaptation.

As a contribution to the excitement of the election period, "The Dark Horse" carries a certain satirical message, but it is really fast and frolicsome entertainment that will give ma and pa and the kids, who are waiting their first vote a splendid evening of laughs.

Through a comedy of errors a dumbbell gets the nomination for governor. It then becomes a real job to elect him and, for this purpose, a high powered promoter (Warren William) is rescued from the alimony prison.

With the entrance upon the scene of William the story moves rapidly, with comedy and melodrama mixed in liberal portions.

Besides the two featured leads, the cast includes Guy Kibbee, Robert Warwick, Frank McHugh, Sam Hardy and Vivienne Osborne.

This picture may well be tabbed as 100 per cent entertainment, with added interest because of its timeliness and the realism that has been injected into it.

"ARSENE LUPIN" AT HOLLYWOOD TODAY

In selecting a vehicle suitable for the combined talents of the two Barrymores, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer hit upon the French stage success "Arsene Lupin" by Maurice Le Blanc and Francis de Croisset, a drawing room mystery drama whose adroit combination of emotional situations, surprising turns in plot and whimsical comedy was believed to give the famous stage and screen stars every opportunity for effective joint portrayals. It appears at the Hollywood today.

The title character, as well known to readers of Le Blanc's mystery stories as to those who saw the play based on these narratives, is enacted by John Barrymore, whose work in portraying the notorious but debonair Paris thief is said to have entailed an ingenious makeup when, in order to thwart the ruthless detective, Guichard, he wore a wig and a dottering flower seller. The detective whose shrewd moves are met by the most unexpected and bewildering obstacles is played by Lionel Barrymore.

The important supporting cast includes Karen Morley in the principal feminine role, John Miljan, Tully Marshall, Henry Armetta, George Davis, John Davidson, James Mack and Mary Jane Irving. Direction was entrusted to Jack Conway who achieved such noteworthy results with the Joan Crawford racketeer picture, "Paid."
