CHEMEKETANS PLAN FOR ANNUAL OUTING

Salem Chemeketans are planning now for their fourth annual outing which is always the high point of the year's activities. This year the camp will be at Spirit lake on the north side of Mt. St. Helens, in Washington. In 1929 the outing was at Marion lake with Mt. Jefferson as the goal; in 1930 at Scott lake, and the Sisters peaks were climbed; last year the camp was at Indian Henry's in Rainier national park and Mt. Rainier was scaled. The dates for this year's camp are August 7-20, and the mountain climb will be on August 14th.

A variety of diversions are possible from this camp ground: boating, hiking, fishing, climbing, and numerous short expeditions will be made to points of interest aside from the big climb of the snow peak. The assessment is made to cover the actual expenses, and costs this year are considerably less than formerly. INDIAN SCHOOL TO GET SPUR TRACKS

Other Efficiency Items Also
On Ryan's Improve-
ment Program

CHEMAWA, July 15.—The program of James T. Ryan, superintendent of the Chemawa vocational school, contemplates many new improvements and changes at the school plant during the present vacation period. One of these is the spur from the main line of the Southern Pacific, which will be about a quarter of a mile in length and will extend to the site of the present power plant.

This will greatly facilitate the unloading of supplies, especially fuel oil, which has until this time been piped from the present oil house to the plant, a distance of nearly a half mile. During cold weather this necessitated heating the oil and was quite expensive.

New and complete x-ray equipment, modern in every respect, is being installed in the school hospital.

Several electric refrigerators have been installed in the home-making departments and other departments on the campus. A large food mixer and grinder has been purchased for the school bakery, and the shoe shop is being equipped with the latest equipment for instruction in this trade. The hospital kitchen has been supplied with a large gas range. A new ice manufacturing plant with milk cooler for the dairy is being installed to replace the worn out equipment in use for many years. The dormitories and school buildings are to be equipped with a master clock time system, whereby buzzers and bells will be sounded at the desired time of day, assuring all departments having accurate time. Many other minor repairs in the way of painting and overhauling are receiving attention.
