ed as chairman he has covered virtually the entire state obtaining much first-hand information relative to present highways and those contemplated in the near future. He was active in efforts to prevent harm to highways from heavy trucks.

Economy Brought About by Commission
Shortly after he took the chairmanship, the commission reorganized the highway department, cutting wages, reducing the number of men on the staff and adding to the efficiency of the organization. Scott took the highway job after he had served the greater part of a year as the resident of the governor's tax league organized in 1931 to hold down expenditures through the subordinate divisions of government in the state.

While it was evident yesterday at the capitol that the governor and his former highway commission chairman parted in good temper, it was also apparent that Scott would not go on longer as chairman of a commission whose policies he felt were radically different from the ones he promulgated.

Relief Wage Ruling Was Not Accepted
The governor, on the other hand, had been pressed into his acceptance of a 50 cents an hour wage for unemployed relief by organized labor which insisted such payment was equitable.

Since the new scale was announced, it had become generally known that Scott was dissatisfied and had offered to resign more than a week ago. The governor urged him to stay on the commission but yesterday Scott determined he would not longer continue a position he felt was anomalous.

When the matter of a new highway commission was being considered this winter, Ira Powers and Raymond Wilcox, both of Portland, were mentioned for appointment. Whether they are now being considered was not announced at the executive offices yesterday.

WILL YOUNG CHAPLINS OUTSHINE FAMOUS DAD?

Recently signed on a two-year contract to make five pictures, the children of Charlie Chaplin and Vita Grey Chaplin, his former wife, will shortly make their debut before the camera and klieg lights of Hollywood, taking their first step in the career that brought their father world renown. The boys, Charles, Jr., and Sydney, are still too young to have any definite ambitions as to the type of roles they would like to play, but their mother says that they will not make any attempt to mimic the style of comedy of which their dad is the greatest exponent. Chaplin himself is said to be displeased at his children's attempt to attain a place in the Hollywood firmament and it is believed in some quarters that he may endeavor to place some legal obstacle in the way. However, it is felt that such action on Chaplin's part would be fought tooth and nail by the children's mother, his former wife, who asserts that Charlie has never shown the slightest interest in his children's welfare since a court placed them in her custody and assessed him \$850,000 for their upkeep.

HIGH SCHOOL COST PER CAPITA DROPS

A steady reduction in per capita costs of high school education in Salem in the face of continuing increase in student enrollment and attendance is noted in reports for the 1931-1932 school year filed this week with the county superintendent of schools. Per capita costs per high school student during the past year were \$97.15 compared with \$104.11 in 1930-1931 and \$112.07 in 1929-1930. The basis for the figures included terms for interest return on building investments and other fixed charges and from these determinations the tuition charge to other schools is made.

Enrollment in the last three years has gone up steadily in Salem high school. Last year an all-time high mark of 2105 was reached, compared to 1937 during the former year and 1845 three years ago.

The average daily attendance of students in the school was 1799 this year compared to 1644 the year before and 1519 three years ago. Total costs for the high school last year were \$174,745, figured on the basis used for arriving at tuition charges. Not all of these costs required cash outlay as an interest on buildings charge of approximately \$20,000 a year is included in this figure. High school costs for 1930-1931 were \$171,182 and for 1929-1930 were \$171,453.

CANZONERI UNABLE TO REGAIN CROWN

PHILADELPHIA, July 18—(AP)—Johnny Jadick of Philadelphia retained his world's junior welterweight crown tonight by winning a 10-round decision over Tony Canzoneri, lightweight world champion, in a slugfest at the Philadelphia ball park. The crowd booed the decision and threw cushions into the ring.

Canzoneri, whose lightweight title was not at stake, made a strong bid to retain the junior welter crown which he lost to Jadick six months ago, but a stinging left jab continually thwarted him.

Tony did plenty of stiff punching, however, and several times Jadick was staggered with right hand punches to the jaw and body. Canzoneri was fighting at a weight disadvantage of two and one-quarter pounds, scaling 133 to Jadick's 135 1/2.

Fighting a defensive battle throughout, Jadick worked his rapier-like left to perfection, halting Canzoneri's rushes with damaging jabs. Several times, however, the challenger got inside and left and rocked the Philadelphia with blows that drew blood from the latter's nose. At least four times during the mill, Tony landed stiff right-handers to Jadick's jaw.

The Babe was injured when he attempted to field a short fly from the bat of Carey Selph in the seventh. As his leg gave way Ruth fell headlong to the ground and had to be helped to the dressing room where an examination disclosed a torn ligament in the right leg just above the knee.

A physician said Ruth should be able to walk in a few days, but the Yankees' trainer, Earl Painter, said the Babe would not play ball again for three weeks.

addition to funds provided for federal aid roads.

The governor was advised in a recent telegram from Senator McNary that "The amount made available by congress for relief of destitution shall be payable to the governor of the state upon application, who shall certify to the necessity for funds and that state resources and private contributions are inadequate to meet relief needs."

Governor Meier was advised in another telegram from Senator McNary that approximately \$7,200,000 of federal money for highway operations will be available when the bill becomes a law. Oregon's share under the current appropriations of federal funds for highway work is \$3,500,000. The relief bill provided the additional amount of \$3,700,000.

Fewer Letters But More Total Postage, Report

Some shrinkage in the number of pieces of first-class mail received at the Salem postoffice is being recorded because of the one-cent increase in postage but the total money received at the office will apparently go far ahead of the returns under the old rates.

"It is my estimate that the increase will be about 35 per cent," Assistant Postmaster Hibbard said yesterday. Hibbard said he thought many people would economize for a short time on their expenditures for first-class postage only to increase the sum spent as they forgot about the higher rates or become accustomed to them.

The bonds matured July 15 and have not borne interest since that date. The \$24,000 sum marks the end of an \$850,000 issue authorized in 1920 for road work in this county. As soon as the holders of the bonds claim their money, Marion county will have no outstanding bonded or warrant debt.
