Under the Dome

LESLIE M. SCOTT, chairman of the state highway commission, resigned late yesterday. His resignation, predicted during the past few weeks, was announced following a long conference he held with the governor. Scott resigned on the eve of another highway meeting to be held in Portland tomorrow.

Scott has made an excellent chairman, and although his term was brief, his name will go down along with that of H. B. Van Duzer as officials who worked tirelessly at their jobs. Scott was well liked and was an official who made up his mind quickly and knew what the job was all about. And he studied the roads and the problems.

Rumor has it that E. B. Aldrich, Pendleton editor, likewise will resign from the commission, leaving only Carl Washburne of the present personnel. Washburne was expected to follow the governor's commission regardless of the action of Aldrich. The governor announced the resignation with regret.

The resignation takes effect immediately, which means a new chairman will preside at the meeting at the Benson hotel tomorrow. The successor has not yet been announced, but it is expected he will be named sometime today. The session tomorrow has some important work on hand, it was announced.

The new commissioner will be the seventh highway official to be named by Governor Meier in the year and a half he has been in office. Three different commissions have presided over road construction in Oregon during that time. And many of the appointments have been excellent ones.

Here are the commissioners appointed by the governor, in the order of their naming: C. K. Spaulding to succeed O. S. Gates, William Hanley to succeed M. A. Lynch, J. C. Ainsworth to succeed Chairman H. B. Van Duzer, Leslie M. Scott to succeed Chairman Ainsworth, Carl G. Washburne to succeed Spaulding and E. B. Aldrich to succeed Hanley.

And while considerable interest is focused on the highway situation, a lot is likewise centered on the meeting of the state board of higher education in Portland again today. Yesterday the board worked without mentioning the chancellorship, and adjourned until 11 o'clock today.

Whether or not W. J. Kerr will be the new chancellor appears to be the paramount issue. Kerr has been the one over whom the board has been in controversy, and his name is reported favored by a majority of the members. The tie-up seems to be the desire to reach a unanimous decision on the president of the state institutions.

Today in Salem the public utilities commissioner will hear the final arguments in the rate investigation of the Northwest Electric company. The arguments are expected to be completed during the day. The commission's order will follow the consideration of these arguments, which is expected to consume several weeks.

Electric Rates Arguments Will Be Heard Today
Arguments of attorneys in the hearing involving the rates, charges and practices of the Northwest Electric company will open here today before Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner.

Taking of testimony in the case was concluded in Portland a month ago. Thomas said it probably would require three or four days to complete the arguments. Other investigations now being conducted by the utilities commissioner involve the California-Oregon Power company, with Oregon headquarters at Medford, and the Mountain States Power company, with offices at Albany.
