

PICTORIAL CHURCH MAP IS NEW PLAN

Leaders of Sunday School
Council to Gather Photo-
graphs in County

PRATUM, July 19.—District Sunday school officers from five districts met Sunday afternoon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred de Vries. Time was spent in informal discussion of things pertaining to Sunday school work.

Among other things it was decided that a map of the county would be made with each Sunday school furnishing a photograph of the church building or school house in which the Sunday school is held. The photograph should be 4x6 or post card size. Districts outside of Salem should send their photos to their district president. Fred de Vries, route 4, Salem, will arrange the form of the county map.

The pictures will be reduced in size to about 2 inches or smaller. Salem churches will be placed in a square, while the other churches over the county will be placed in their exact location. Where at all practical the picture should be taken from the south, the camera facing north, to make the building appear right on the map.

Rebecca Mount Recounts Highlights of Journey Across Plains For Clan

SILVERTON, July 19.—In spite of her 91 years there was no gay-er member of the clan at the Hansen Stevens reunion held at Silvertown Sunday, than Mrs. Rebecca Mount, one of the dwindling band of original pioneers. Mrs. Mount and her sister, Mrs. Sarah McCubbins of Dayton, Wash., were the only two present who had crossed the plains by ox team in 1852. The reunion, the 42d one held by the Stevens clan, is in commemoration of Mrs. Mount's and Mrs. McCubbins' father, Hansen Stevens.

Dr. Albert Mount of Oregon City acted as chairman of the day and W. H. Stevens of Silvertown is secretary-treasurer. Those responding to the call of the toastmaster, Dr. Mount, included Mrs. Rebecca Mount, Mrs. McCubbins, Rev. Albyn Esson and Mrs. Esson of Albany, Miles McKay of Salem, Julius Alm, Ronald Esson, Daisy Bump and Mary Marquam.

Meet Next at Champeog
An invitation to meet with the Ringo branch of the family at Champeog next year was accepted. The first Stevens reunion was held June 16, 1891 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Stevens, on the old Stevens donation land claim on Howell Prairie. The object of this was just a surprise planned by his family for Mr. Stevens. Thirty seven were present. It proved so enjoyable that a motion to hold a reunion each year was carried and since then no year has been missed.

This year was the 80th anniversary since the crossing of the plains and this feature was particularly stressed. Mrs. Rebecca Mount told about the trip. "Twenty two wagons started from Keokuk, Ia., that beautiful April day. I can see them lined up on the hill. Only one wagon reached Silvertown; that was my father's. Some of the men quarreled and parted company. I had to drive the team part of the way. Our men were busy with the cat-

tle. Father took up a donation land claim and we built a cabin in the winter of 1852. I was married at 16 and my oldest son was born when I was 17 years old."

Mrs. Mount mothered 14 children, 13 of them her own. She and her husband, who died a few years ago, observed their 50th wedding anniversary in the home she is now living in, 25 years ago. Her children who are still living are Dr. Albert Mount and Dr. Guy Mount of Oregon City; Eva Wolfard and Will Mount of Silvertown; Nona Kinny of Fallon, Nev.; Attorney O. B. Mount of Baker, Ore.; Robert Mount of Hood River; Minnie Hall and Clara Chamberau of Portland.
