

Girls Star on Diamond But Senators Win, Score 8 to 4

FAST FIELDING FEATURES TILT

Double Play no Trouble for Langford and Jaax of Kansas Travelers

Perhaps just for the purpose of demonstrating that the male is still supreme on the baseball diamond—but not too overwhelmingly supreme—the Salem Senators defeated the Southern Kansas Stage Lines girls' baseball team 8 to 4 on Olinger field Wednesday.

Five girls who, "just as advertised" combined pleasant appearance with considerable baseball ability—remarkable ability for members of their sex, fair ability when compared with men in semipro ranks—teamed with four extremely capable and hard working men to provide the Senators with competition that kept them on their toes. The game wasn't "in the bag" at any time.

The girls did not shine as brightly as they had in previous games. Fay Langford and Corene Jaax did figure in the base hit making. Miss Langford smacked one that Walt Erickson managed to knock down but couldn't retrieve in time, and Miss Jaax, shifting to a port-side stance at the plate because the sun was too bad from the other side, grinned and rapped out a Texas leaguer.

But in the field those two held their own with the men among other feats figuring in a neat double play. Miss Jaax stopped some throws that would have caused any first baseman trouble. Miss Champlin in left field pulled in, as nonchalantly as though she were a Chick Haffey, a drive from Erickson's bat that appeared to be ticketed for a triple.

The four men, thoroughly drilled in the job of doing a little more than their share without making it any more obvious than necessary, also drew their share of approbation from the Salem fans. Schmidt in center field made a couple of spectacular plays and Brady, in addition to pitching acceptably, made a circus catch while diving head first into the crowd near the third base bleachers.

Erickson's Homer Brings First Scores
Walt Erickson's homer—legitimate even if a fast man had been playing left field—brought in two runs for the Senators in the first inning. Hits by Foreman, Kitchen and Ashby coupled with a walk, meant three in the second. An error and hits by Olinger and Gribble raised it to six in the third after the visitors had scored two due to Wood's temporary loss of control in the first half. Hits by Olinger and Gribble again in the seventh combined with a passed ball and an error to chalk up the last two.

Miss Langford's hit followed by McCallister's single and a two-base blow by Cody, gave the Wichita team its two runs in the fifth. Wood struck out 18 including four of the men.

The girls played nice ball in the field, outside of the third baseman who was slowed up by a sprained ankle. But, giving all due credit and considering that these are some of the best girl players could be found, it was evident that baseball is not yet a profession open to the average girl.

However, we don't like for Eugene or anybody to have a squawk. We believe, in fact know, that the man who has been umpiring is perfectly square, but he appears to be out of practice at calling them and there has been a lot of beefing on both sides in the last two games.

We had a chance to adopt a small boy at the wrestling match Tuesday night. Quite a number of lads were hanging around, many of them apparently with the same idea in mind. Boys accompanied by one parent were being admitted free, and this one wanted us to be his "dad" just long enough to get through the door. We felt obliged, but a little too well known.
