

# DOUPREE POE IS FOUND GUILTY

## Life Imprisonment to be Penalty; Ripley Case Will Start Today

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the streets of Silverton, Manning holds that Ripley was scheduled to strike Iverson with a wrench if he failed to throw up his hands when directed to do so and that Poe, from the back seat of the car the trio was using, shot and killed Iverson.

Burriss Says Poe's Bearing Significant

Court opened Monday morning with the statement by Lyle Page, assistant prosecutor, who reviewed the testimony in the case and called for Poe's conviction.

Paul Burriss, defense counsel, in his sole statement to the jury characterized Frank Manning's testimony as the statement of a guilty man trying to save his life. He contrasted Manning's alleged frightened, ringing tone to the clear, cool and definite story told by Poe. Burriss pleaded for fair play for his client. He said he was receiving nothing in payment for the defense of Poe but had undertaken the case in order that justice might prevail.

District Attorney John Carson closed the state's case with a strong plea that Poe be found guilty as charged, without recommendation. Carson discounted Poe's statement made Saturday stating that he was not in Silverton and had been on the Wheatley place in bed when Iverson's slaying was consummated.

Carson contrasted Poe's record with that of Manning, pointing out that Poe had often been guilty of crime while Manning, save for minor infractions of the law, was without a police record. He scoffed at Poe's statement that he would not accompany Robert Ripley and Manning in the alleged liquor raid. The prosecutor pointed out to the jury that Poe's story exactly coincided with the one told by Manning except for the period of the Silverton murder.

Arguments Finished

Just before 11 o'clock

At the request of the attorneys for both sides, the jury was kept intact during the noon recess. Counsel for the prosecution finished arguments to the jury at 11:45 a. m. Judge Wilson began his instructions to the jury at 2 p. m.

The courtroom was crowded again Monday morning and several scores of people were barred.

Poe, defendant, manifested much interest in the arguments of the prosecutors, smiling slightly from time to time as the district attorney and his assistants touched on some phase of the evidence.

Later in the day Poe was held, handcuffed, in the sheriff's office, two floors below the room where the jury was deliberating. He was ready to talk to office deputies and visitors as they came, interspersing his remarks by snatch readings of recent magazines. Poe expressed himself as sanguine that the jury would acquit him but said he was "not an iron man" and naturally was nervous due to the suspense. He said he was well pleased with the work of his attorney, Paul Burriss, but wished the trial could have been postponed until September because he then could have had more time to gather evidence.

# MARTIAL RULE IN BERLIN WILL END

BERLIN, July 25.—(AP)—After the supreme court at Leipzig had refused today to squelch the Prussian dictatorship by the injunction method, the federal government decided to put an end to martial law in Berlin and the province of Brandenburg which was declared July 20 in order that the federal dictator might have a free hand.

President Von Hindenburg will be asked by the cabinet tomorrow to rescind his martial law decree, and it was authoritatively understood he would accede to the request.

The action of the Leipzig supreme court was taken on a request by the deposed government of Prussia for an injunction restraining Chancellor Franz von Papen, federal commissioner who assumed dictatorial powers over the state, from interfering with the regular Prussian government.

# Canada Offers Extensive List As Trade Basis

OTTAWA, July 25.—(AP)—The British Imperial Economic conference got down to brass tacks today when Canada laid before the other delegates her celebrated list of 8,000 import commodities which are expected to serve as the basis for her bargaining with the other powers of the empire.

This list has been accepted as the key to important trade agreements likely to be drawn up between Canada and the united kingdom to the possible detriment of the United States and other non-empire nations that trade with the dominion.

Charter memberships are available only until August 1. Every native born Oregonian and those of 20 years residence are eligible for membership.
