

JOHN AICHER RITES TODAY IN WOODBURN

WOODBURN, July 28.—John Henry Aicher died at his home on the Woodburn-Mount Angel highway early Wednesday morning. Death came after he had suffered several weeks from a blood disease. He was 32 years old.

John H. Aicher was born May 18, 1900 at the Aicher home east of Woodburn, and lived in this vicinity all his life. His farm is one of the best in that section. Besides his wife, Mrs. Leona Aicher and a small baby, he is survived by his father Joe Aicher, a sister, Mrs. Thomas Wellman of Sebo, and brothers Sebastian and Frank, all of Woodburn.

Funeral services will be held from the St. Luke's Catholic church in Woodburn Friday morning at 9 o'clock. Burial will be at the St. Luke's cemetery, north of this city.

During the war he was an officer in the ordnance department of the army.
