

SCOUTS TO OCCUPY CAMP FOR PERIOD

Four Leaders to Conduct Outing for Gervais Troop at Santaly

GERVAIS, July 28.—Nineteen members of the Gervais Girl Scout troop are to go to Camp Santaly Sunday for the annual summer outing. Mrs. A. B. Adkinson, scout leader, and Mrs. Virginia O. Booser will be chaperones and Miss Carol Minaker will go as life guard. Miss McAlpine of the Salem health department will be at the camp two days during the week to instruct the girls in first aid. Other branches to be studied are swimming, archery and bird lore. They will return the following Sunday.

A. F. Hayes, onion grower in the Lake Labish section is trying out an experiment to stamp out "thrip," a disease which affects the onions in the latter part of the growing season by deadening and whitening them. A mixture of powdered lime and sulphur is being dusted over the onions from an airplane which flies low over the field at the rate of 60 or 70 miles an hour, dusting the mixture on by a fan.

The airplane is owned by the Eyerly company of Salem and is specially equipped for this purpose. Mr. Hayes owns 350 acres of onions and the cost of dusting the entire acreage would be approximately a thousand dollars. The experiment is being tried on a seven-acre tract. The summer carnival and chicken dinner given Sunday by Sacred Heart church was highly successful. More than 400 diners were served. A good program was given for the entertainment of guests during the afternoon and evening. Peter Miller's circus parade provided the most merriest. Vocal and instrumental numbers were given.

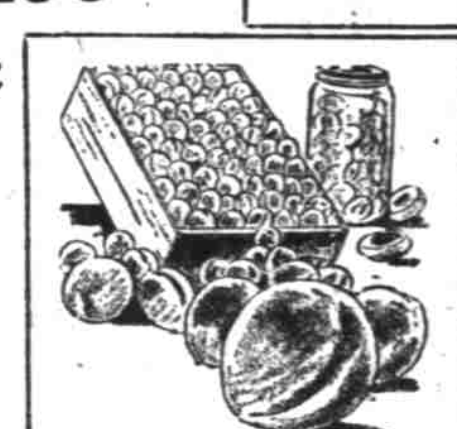
