This would mean that about 60 new lawyers will start out in the state. The two who were let out this week both had become involved in criminal charges. Sam A. Johnson of Klamath Falls was disbarred and Walton Shay of Portland resigned upon request of the trouble department of the Multnomah county bar association.

Well, the Iverson murder case, which started out as a mystery May 1, 1931, is about cleared up and three young men scheduled to spend the rest of their normal lives in the state penitentiary. One phase which has interested this column from about the first however still stands. The only part Luke S. May, alleged detective of Seattle, played in the solution was collecting about \$100 from the county. Judge Fred W. Wilson of The Dalles, who heard the Poe and Ripley trials and the confession of Manning, made many friends in Marion county during his stay. Judge Wilson is a likeable gentleman and his conduct of the trials was above reproach. The Poe case, one of his records was broken. He said prior to that he never had a murder jury report before 3 a.m. the next morning after getting the case.

While the state highway commission called off its ire here set for today, it did call a short one for Portland this afternoon. The two members of the commission (the third not being named yet by the governor) will meet at the Benson hotel to allocate \$770,000 of federal forest road money. Marion county is expected to get some of this for the Santiam highway.

POCKET VETO SEEN FOR LOAN MEASURE

WASHINGTON, July 28 — (AP)—A pocket veto loomed as a direct certainty tonight for a bill to broaden the base of indirect reconstruction corporation loans to farmers.

The president left the executive offices late today without placing his signature on the measure, and unless he signed later without public announcement, the bill died automatically at midnight.
