

CITY COLLECTS ON OLD ACTION

Antiquity of Gasoline Storage Ordinance Talked At Council

WOODBURN, Aug. 4.—City Attorney Blaine McCord was instructed to secure a deed from the sheriff to the Nick Miller property at the Tuesday night meeting of the city council. Miller brought suit against the city several years ago and put up his place as security for the costs of appealing the case to the state supreme court. The city won the case, the decision being handed down over a year ago. The cost of the appeal must be paid, so the Miller place is being taken.

A letter from the Oregon fire chiefs' association suggesting standard ordinances throughout the state concerning gasoline storage, vending and other incidental problems. A copy of a model ordinance was included in the letter. Woodburn's ordinance is obsolete; it allows a gas station to have only five gallons above the ground at one time, and only 100 gallons under ground in one tank. Of course, no gas station in the city is complying with the old ordinance.

Recorder Beach was instructed to notify the state industrial accident commission that the city will not pay accident insurance on the city's fire chief at the rate the commission proposes.

To Buy Wood Cheap
It was decided at the council meeting that the city buy as much wood as possible from persons who are behind on their water bills. About 15 cords of four-foot wood is used annually by the city. The city expects to get the wood from dealers with delinquent water bills for about three dollars a cord.

Plan for the marquee on the Allen building was accepted. The marquee will extend north and south on Front street 58 feet 10 inches, and will extend eight feet 10 inches on the side running east and west. Plans for a marquee in front of the Knapp building on Front street were not approved by the council on the grounds that some of the supports will be too strong enough. The Knapp building includes the Sanitary meat market, a barber shop and confectionery.

Mrs. Cora Stone Dies; Funeral is Held From Bethel

WOODBURN, Aug. 4.—Funeral services for Mrs. Cora Mae Stone, 29 years old, who died Tuesday morning after an illness of several years, were held Thursday morning from the Bethel church. Burial was in the Belle Pass cemetery. Mrs. Stone was well known in this district, having lived here 23 years.

She was born in Lyden, Wash., July 16, 1903. Mrs. Stone's immediate survivors are her husband, John E. Stone, and four children, Alva, 10, Albert, 8, Glen, 3, and Norma, 18 months old. She is also survived by her mother and father, Charles and Alice Skiller.

M'CRAE NOT GUILTY FOR CHILD'S DEATH

MONMOUTH, Aug. 4.—James McCrae was exonerated from charges preferred by Mrs. Ida Bond of Dayton in a suit in Yamhill county court at McMinnville last week. Mrs. Bond was suing James McCrae and Ed Riddell, Monmouth farmers, and Lloyd Goodrich of Dayton, school bus driver for \$10,000 in connection with the accidental death of her young daughter, Victory Bond, 10, last March.

The child had stepped off the school bus, driven by Goodrich, on the Dayton road, at her usual destination. She then dodged behind the bus and ran directly in front of a car owned by Ed Riddell, and driven by McCrae, and was struck by the car, sustaining injuries from which she died. Goodrich's case was thrown out of court for lack of evidence of any complicity on his part in the child's death. McCrae's case went to the jury, which was out about half an hour, and returned a verdict clearing him of all charges. Attorneys Haytor of Dallas and Burdette of McMinnville appeared for the defense, with Senn of Portland representing Goodrich. Marsh & Vinter of McMinnville, handled the prosecution.
