GATHER ON SUNDAY**Reunion Recalls Pioneers
Of 1852; Meeting to
Be at Albany

Sunday, August 14, descendants of William, Peter and Joseph Bilyeu will again gather at Bryant Park, Albany, to hold their third annual reunion. The three Bilyeu families who came to the Oregon coast in 1852, 1849 and 1854 respectively, were residents of Missouri and took up homesteads in Oregon. The homesteads are no longer in the family, but Bilyeu Den and Bilyeu Creek, in the county seat of Seaside, still honor these hardy pioneers.

A program will be given at 11 a. m., consisting entirely of Bilyeu talent. James D. Bryant will give the address of welcome and Dr. V. R. Bilyeu, Dr. W. R. Bilyeu, Elsie Bilyeu, Thomas Bilyeu, Clyde Bryant and Dr. Monroe Cooley will follow with short talks. Talks will be interspersed with music furnished by Roy Thomas and Robert, Dean and Edith Bilyeu.

Each family is asked to bring a basket of lunch, and at noon a catered picnic will be served. The afternoon will be spent in visiting and playing games, and there will also be races for the younger people, as well as swimming and pitching horseshoes.

Announcements have been mailed to 200 families, and it is expected that at least 500 persons will attend the reunion this year. Most of those who attend are Oregonians, but quite a number come from Lyle, Kalama and Tokos, Wash., and a few come from as far as San Diego, Sacramento and Los Angeles.
