

# IMPROVED MILK QUALITY SHOWN

### No Distributor Lowered in Rating, two are Added To "A" List Here

horn says. "Grade 'A' pasteurized and grade 'A' raw are the safest grades of milk on the market. . . Grades lower than grade 'A' pasteurized and grade 'A' raw, under the terms of an ordinance passed early last grading period, are allowed to be sold in Salem only during temporary periods of degrading not exceeding 15 consecutive days, when such lower grades are sold under a label indicating their true grading."

The grades of milk have been determined by the local health department in accordance with the grade specifications of the United States public health service milk control code. Salem is one of eight cities in Oregon and of over 450 in the nation working under this type of milk ordinance.

The inspector has given local milk distributors the following ratings:

Grade "A" pasteurized—Capitol dairies, Curley's dairy, Foshay dairy, Hazel Dell dairy, O. K. Dairy, Producers Milk company, Purdy dairy, Salem Sanitary Milk company, Waldo Hills Guernsey dairy.

# LAST OF VETERANS LEAVE JOHNSTOWN

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Johnstown watched two strangely different parades tonight as it turned its back on the departing shabby boys army and welcomed groups of the American Legion.

Two days of impatient delay ended with the announcement that every tank would be filled with gas and every driver given a dollar and ordered to move out of the dismal B. E. F. camp.

A few protested, some laughed, but the majority accepted the city's "last offer." Cars, battered and dirty and piled high with bundles, bedding and other belongings, rolled out of the city.

In less than three hours, 96 cars were supplied with gas and on their way.  
A few blocks away, Legion drum and bugle corps, here for "Legion day," paraded in gaudy uniforms to martial strains and the applause of townfolk.

# HOOVER DISARMING PLAN IS APPROVED

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(AP)—At least partial success of President Hoover's suggestion for one-third reduction in world armaments was freely predicted by members of the American delegation to the world disarmament conference as they returned from Geneva today.

They were neither dismayed by criticism, nor over-elated at the results obtained in the six months of negotiation.  
"The conference pledged itself to a substantial reduction in land, air and sea armaments and recognized the underlying principle of President Hoover's plan," said Senator Claude A. Swanson of Virginia. "If this specific promise is complied with at the second session of the conference, a further substantial reduction in armament expenditures may be expected."

The next session of the conference will open early in 1933.

# PARAGUAY ACCEPTS ARBITRATION OFFER

ASUNCION, Paraguay, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Paraguay will accept an offer of arbitration of its dispute over the Gran Chaco region with Bolivia, which has been made by the United States and 18 other neutral American nations, the newspaper El Liberal said today.

The paper asserted it had learned unofficially that the nation's acceptance will be coupled with praise for the declaration by the neutrals that they will not recognize any territorial changes resulting from the use of arms. El Liberal interpreted this policy as condemnation of the course pursued by Bolivia.

An official bulletin said Bolivian activity in the Chaco region was increasing. A Bolivian patrol, consisting of five or six men, fired on an outpost of Fort Presidente Ayza this afternoon, but the attack was easily repulsed, the bulletin said. Other sectors were reported quiet.
