Theatre Case up—The preliminary hearing for Ray Kiser and Edna Parks, held on charges growing out of theatre robberies here and in other Pacific coast cities, will be held in justice court Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The specific charge is assault and robbery armed with a dangerous weapon. This is the first criminal case to come up in justice court in a week, as Justice of the Peace Miller Hayden has been out of town the past week. Kiser and Mrs. Parks were arrested just before the series of murder trials started here, and hearing could not be held earlier because the district attorney's office was tied up with the murder prosecutions.

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TOM HILL TO HEAD LOCAL DRUM CORPS

Named Manager, Succeeds Dr. Looney; Group Hard At Work for Event

Tom Hill was named manager of the American Legion drum corps yesterday by Irl S. McSherry, commander of Capital Post No. 2, to take the place of Dr. W. W. Looney, who resigned owing to the press of personal business. The new manager has been active in the affairs of Capital Post for several years and is at present a member of the executive committee. He has been a member of the drum corps from the beginning of the organization and plays a bugle.

Capital post drum corps has been hard at practice since the first of April in preparation for the national convention in Portland September 12-15. The local corps will enter the national competition with some 60 other corps. This will make the fourth appearance of the Salem corps at a National convention of the American Legion.

For the past few months the members have been reporting for practice twice each week. This schedule has been revised now and three practices will be held a week until just before the convention when additional ones will be scheduled.

The time now is devoted to perfecting the new drills and new special musical numbers for the competition. Rudy Schultz is directing the musical work and Webb Moorman, a member of the corps, has assumed the duties of drill master. The definite personnel of the corps will not be announced until a later date.

LUMBER CALL FOR OVER PRODUCTION

SEATTLE, Aug. 6—A total of 321 mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending July 30 operated at 19 per cent of capacity, as compared to 18.8 per cent for the previous week and 39.4 per cent for the same week last year. During the week 211 of these plants were reported as closed and 110 as operating. Current new business of 316 identical mills was 41.5 per cent over production. This group reported production approximately one-half million feet more than the previous week. Shipments for the week were 32.4 per cent over production.

Inventories, as reported by 144 mills decreased 10,992 M. feet from the week ending July 23 and are 22.7 per cent less than at this time last year. Unfilled orders increased 3,174,000 feet from the previous week. New export business received during the week was 4,260,000 feet more than the volume reported for the previous week. New domestic cargo orders were 13,678,000 feet over the previous week, new rail business decreased 654,000 feet, while the local trade increased 1,660,000 feet from the previous week's business.

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William McGilchrist, Jr. District Rotary Governor To Head Big Meeting Here

And it came about that in Glasgow, Scotland, in the year of 1830, a blue eyed Scot, one William McGilchrist, Jr., was born who was destined to travel at the age of six years to Portland, Oregon, and thence to Salem in 1897; and after the lapse of years to manhood, Scottish lad, grown to manhood, was picked by fellow Rotarians for the office of district governor of District No. 1 Rotary International, comprising Alaska, British Columbia, Oregon, Washington, and the panhandle of Idaho.

And how did it all come about? Fate perhaps, but the interviewer would like to express the opinion that William McGilchrist, Jr., has had the fundamentals of Rotary as a motivating force within him since earliest youth, and that from the time he went into the restaurant business at the early age to be expected from a canny Scotchman, 21 years, he has been living those principles through choice and disposition. When Rotary was organized in Chicago by one Paul Harris, attorney, and his friends in 1905, they put into force an organization which fitted the future governor of District No. 1 of Rotary International like the "best dressed gentleman" in the room.

It was not natural that when Salem organized its Rotary chapter in 1920 that "Billy" McGilchrist, Jr., should be there. He is not a charter member because he was out of town at the time of organization but he came in shortly after.

"Service" is Slogan
One slogan of Rotary is "Service above Self", and another is "He profits most who serves best". And the members are urged to give "service" to the club, to give service in business and to give service internationally, and to give service internationally, thus making the scope of service all inclusive. And the trail of Governor McGilchrist's business and career will nicely verify the principles of Rotary to which he is so very much devoted, and will explain why the genial Salem man by district choice placed on the ballot for governor by Portland Rotary and the nomination given by Vancouver, thus not giving the ordinarily source of such nomination, a local club, a chance to do anything but back up the nomination with all its force of membership.

The nominations usually come from several of the 71 clubs of the district in the regular district conference which precedes the international convention. This year no district conference was held and therefore the 71 clubs through representatives got together by letter and telegram and chose Mr. McGilchrist as the nominee whom they will bring to one to appear for election to this district at the international convention held in Seattle. At this election men from all over the world voted into office the various governors of the districts of Rotary International.

Leader Will Report
A school for district governors preceded the Seattle convention and this was attended by Mr. McGilchrist. The messages received at this school and at the international convention will be brought to the 71 Rotary clubs which he will visit this coming year. His first lectures will be given before

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'STAY AT HOME' IS ADVICE TO JOBLESS

Farm Labor Division Chief Confers With Officials Of Salem Agency

"If unemployed people have money, they should save it to buy food; if they have no money, they should stay home, save expense to the communities they would travel through in search of work."

In these words, Mr. Montgomery, assistant national director for the farm labor division of the United States employment service, admonished laborers who are out of work and considering moving away from their home territory, when he conferred with local employment officials here yesterday.

Mr. Montgomery stopped here a short while, conferred and lunched with C. A. Kells, manager, and D. D. Dotson, assistant manager of the local employment bureau, and J. E. Smith, county commissioner. He also interviewed C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

Seeking accurate information on farm labor conditions, Mr.

Right now I have a girl who does nothing but Rotary work—20 and 40 letters a day, in addition to other things. That of course will not be so heavy with this assembly out of the way."

But the business principles as well as the service ideals meet with the administration and natural tendencies of the new governor. He has traveled along from restaurant man to the owner of the first cafeteria, the old "Royal", to be opened in Salem, then furniture man, and since war time readjustment he has been interested in real estate brokerage and loans, through all of which he has progressed as "Billy" and with honor. And he is still camera and paper shy—it was hard to make the canny Scot "give" information and as for pictures, well, the one appearing with this article is the second one ever to appear in a newspaper—and personally he thinks that will be enough.

The entire year will require the coverage of 20,000 miles, in travel. And "with the sale of a few loganberries" he hopes to top the list off with attending the 1933 international convention to be held in Boston.

A Rotary enthusiast is Mr. McGilchrist and "Mrs. McGilchrist keeps up with it right along with me" is the happy boast of the governor. "She has attended every large gathering to which I have been able to go, and she follows the literature concerning Rotary and sees that I keep up", and there was pride in those words! And we found out that that pride had 20 years in which to grow for Miss Eva Josephine Savage became Mrs. McGilchrist in 1912.

Rotary Has Grown
"Ah, this is a fine organization," said the governor. "In July, 1932, there were 3,520 clubs, with a membership of 155,000 Rotarians. In the United States alone there are 2,444 clubs. The organization is scattered over 68 countries. And it's efficient—everything in its business is carried on with precision and exactness. Every letter received must be answered before the day is done."

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Montgomery two months ago set out from his headquarters at Kansas City, Mo., visited the wheat belts in the Dakotas, drove on to Yakima, Hood River and Salem. From here he will go to California.

There is positively no agricultural work anywhere that is available to outsiders, he declared. In the apple regions of Oregon and Washington, for example, he said large camps of transient laborers, awaiting crop onset, are already established there.

Montgomery is working out a scheme to advise workers to the south of here at the scarcity of farm work in the northwest. He is considering setting up an office at the southern Oregon border for this purpose.
