Led by "one-hit" Heller, who hurled that variety of ball against Eugene last Sunday, the Schapp's, formerly Pacific Outfitters, baseball team will invade Salem today for the final state league game here, playing the Senators at 2:30 on Olinger field.

A victory today would retain for the Senators a mathematical chance to tie for the pennant, provided that Eugene should drop West Side in their contest at Eugene, but there are several factors which must be taken into account before the Senators achieve that situation. It would be necessary for Schapp's to beat West Side next week and for Bend to beat Eugene next Sunday, even if Salem should win both of its remaining games, the second of which is with Albany on the Albany diamond.

So about all the Senators can reasonably hope for is a place in the first division and they will be fighting for that today. Some of the boys struggled out of a hitting slump last Sunday, notably Walt Erickson who collected three hits; but the blows in that game were confined to the three men huddled around the cleanup position; they got on the paths but nobody brought them home. The Senators may set a season record for "died on bases" unless they take a spurt.

Roberts, first baseman who was Schapp's bantam in the team's former appearance here, is still going strong, having been the only player to get two blows in the mound duel at Eugene last Sunday.

COUNTY SQUAD MEETS DALLAS

Salstrom and Nicholson do Good Work; Pitching of Jubitz too Tight

For the first time since American Legion Junior baseball competition in Oregon became general, the final state championship game will be played today with no Marion county team participating. The heads-up, tight fielding, hard hitting Lincoln Cardinals of Portland defeated Woodburn, Marion county's entry this year, 15 to 2 in the first game of the championship playoff in Portland Saturday. Eugene won 11 to 8 from The Dalles and will oppose the Portland champs in the final game today.

However, the Woodburn team will still be in the picture, as it will meet The Dalles at 1:30 in a consolation game.
Moe Jubitz, star flinger of the Portland team, with a lot of spectacular but then a timely base hit, held the hitherto slugging Woodburn team to three blows and no earned runs. That tells the story, and it made no difference in the outcome whatever, that the Woodburn boys booted and threw the ball away for a total of eight errors, and that neither Leftier nor Landsem pined capable of holding the Cardinals in check. Cardinals Get Jump And Press Advantage

A scratch hit, two walks to fill the bases and then a timely base hit, a hit by Miller, gave Wade Williams' boys a three-run bulge in the first inning and they kept pressing their advantage. A hit and an error gave them one run in the second and they scored four in the third on a walk, a hit batsman and a wild pitch, but principally on a succession of throws that were not quite in time and one that was terribly wild. In the midst of that slaughter, Landsem was called in to take Leftier's place.

The Cardinals jumped on Landsem for five hits and four runs, all but one of which were earned. In the fourth, after that it became more like a ball game, Landsem limiting the home boys to three runs and four hits for the remainder of the game.

Nicholson figures in both Woodburn scores. Meanwhile, however, Jubitz had been mowing down the Woodburn batsmen with depressing regularity. Salsfield got a single in the second inning and Salsfield, the only Woodburn infielder who seemed to stay on solid earth, collected one in the fifth. 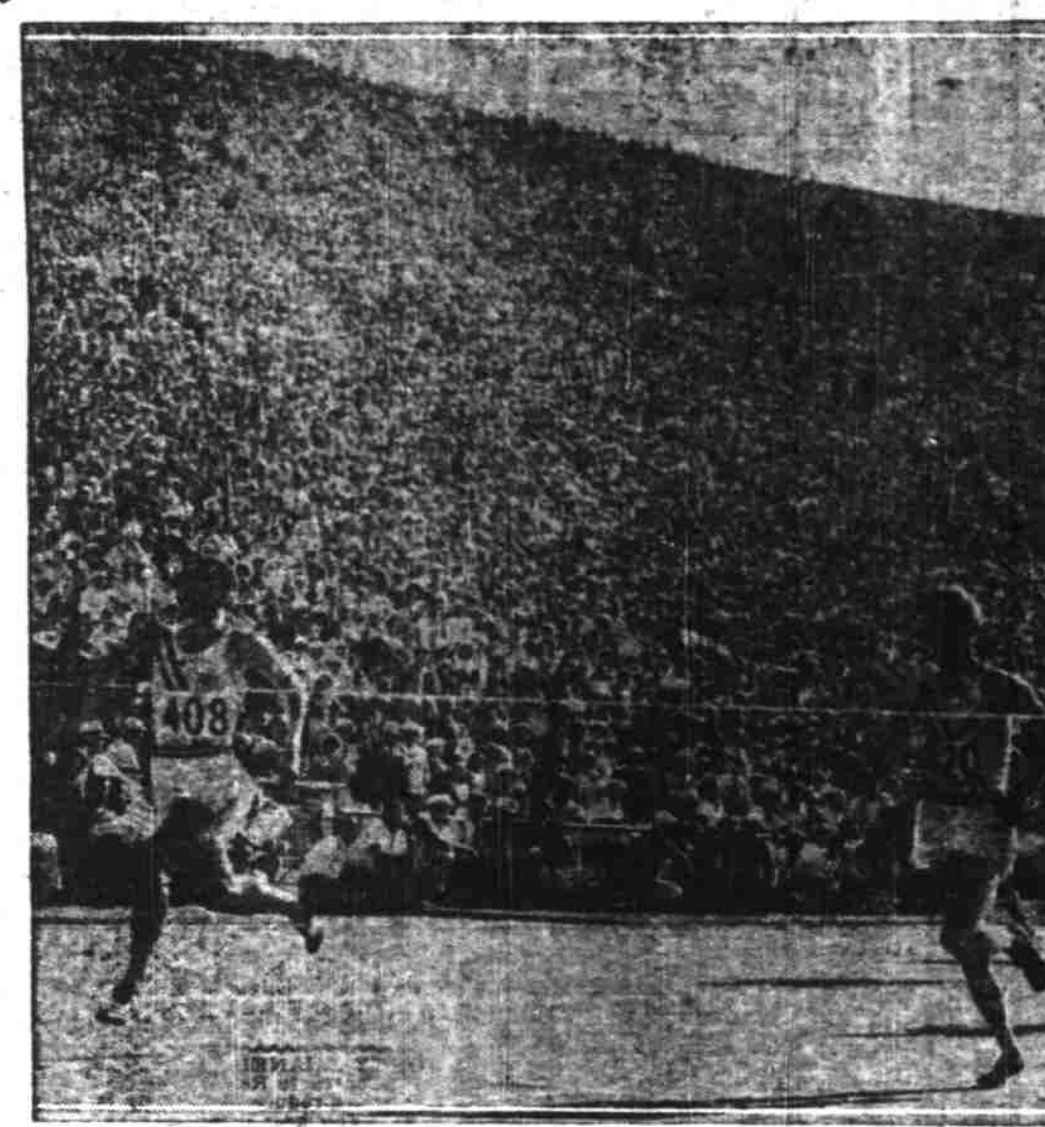

Olympic Swimmers Taking Tip From Track Athletes; Three Marks Are Toppled

OLYMPIC SWIMMING STADIUM, Los Angeles, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Taking a tip from their track and field friends, swimmers of the world opened the aquatic events of the tenth Olympiad today by breaking three Olympic records and eclipsing one world mark three times.

The crowning achievement of the auspicious opening before 500 persons, was that of Mrs. Eleanor Garatti Sayville, who followed up a succession of two record breaking trial heats in the women's 100-meter free style event by traversing the 50-meter pool twice in 1 minute 8.5 seconds, 1.3 seconds faster than Miss Albina Ospiowich's world accepted world's mark, set by the American swimmer in 1928. The San Francisco mermaid, a member of the 1928 team, also broke Miss Ospiowich's Olympic record of 1:11, which was set four years ago at Amsterdam.

Her performance was followed by the bold forward step of Japan in asserting itself as a serious contender for the water carnival honors when 17-year-old Yasuji Miyazaki sped past Johnny Weismuller's Olympic record of 88.6 seconds for the 100-meter free style, winning his semifinal heat in 58 seconds flat.

During the morning, Clare Dennis, of Australia, started off the proceedings in proper fashion by leading the qualifiers in the 200-meter breast stroke for women, with an Olympic record breaking pace of 3:08.

Then, just to top off a large first day, the Hungarian water polo team, playing a brilliant offensive game, swamped the defending champions, Germany, 6 to 2 in a fast, torrid contest.

Bausch Wins For America In Decathlon

OLYMPIC STADIUM, Los Angeles, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Jim Bausch, American all-around star from Kansas, late today captured the Olympic decathlon championship, smashing the world and Olympic records to bits.

Bausch finished the ten-event two-day battle with the spectacular total of 8462.23 points for the greatest all-around performance of all time.

Akilles Jarvinen of Finland, who had held the previous world record at 8255.475 points, surpassed this also but he was satisfied with second place with a total of 8292.48 points.

The former Olympic record, made by Paavo Yrjola of Finland, was 8058.25 points, made in 1928. The next three finishers, in order, were: third, Wolrad Eberle of Germany, with 8059.80 points; fourth, Wilson Charles, United States, 7985 points; fifth, Hans Sievert, Germany, 7941.07 points.

YANKS BETTER 2 RELAY MARKS

Wykoff Gets his Chance in 400-Meters; Steepers Run lap too far

OLYMPIC STADIUM, Los Angeles, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Finland's second long distance Olympic victory, in the steeplechase final, today added another extraordinary chapter to the track and field championships after two crack American relay teams blasted world records loose in the 400 and 1600 meter trials.

There was no question about the superiority this time of Volmari Iso-Hollo, another of Finland's younger stars, in the steeplechase, but the development that the entire field was compelled to run one lap over the specified 3,000 meter distance contributed to the general furor, coming as it did on top of Lauri Lehtinen's disputed conquest of Ralph Hill in the 5000 meter final yesterday. The mistake, which was charged to a new and inexperienced lap-checker, was costly again to the Americans. Joe McCluskey, the black haired boy from Fordham and Connecticut, was running in second place at the regulation 2000 meter mark, but the extra lap was too much for him. He lacked his usual finishing drive and finished third, trailing two yards behind Tom Evenson. Decide They Won't Run It Again Today

The runners, after a long conference, decided against accepting an offer to run the steeplechase over again at the regulation distance. It would have to be run off tomorrow, since the track and field championships have only one more day to go, and they felt it would be too soon to attempt another such grueling test. McCluskey's sportsmanship, under the circumstances, in accepting third place when he might well have been the runner-up, was accorded a big ovation.

The American relay teams, without being extended in either race, turned in smashing performances and indicated they would take additional chunks out of the world records tomorrow, if sufficiently pressed.

Wykoff Anchor Man In Setting Record
The 400 meter team, consisting of Bob Kiesel, Emmett Toppino, Hector Dyer and Frank Wykoff, clicked together beautifully and set a time in 40.6 seconds, wiping out the world mark of 40.8, shared jointly by a German team and the University of Southern California. They also beat the Olympic record of 41 seconds flat, set by the U. S. A. in 1924 and equalled by the Americans in 1928.

With the main battle to be concluded tomorrow with the classic marathon as well as the relay finals, the United States had the Olympic track and field team title stored away by an overwhelming point margin. For 15 events the Americans showed 185 points, the biggest total they have gained in three Olympiads under the present scoring system. Finland was in second place with 62, Great Britain third with 41 and Japan fourth, with 28.

Whether the recent decree of the United States district court in Portland, setting aside the order of Charles M. Thomas, public utility commissioner, in which he ordered a reduction of fares of the Portland traction company from 10 to 7 cents, will be appealed to the United States supreme court, will be determined by Thomas within the next few days.

Thomas declared that any appeal that is taken by his office would be based primarily on the action of the federal district court in refusing to accept in evidence the record prepared by the state utility commissioner, Olive P. Coshaw, chancellor in the case, held that the record was immaterial.

"This record was prepared after many months of hard work and entailed a large expense," Thomas said.

Thomas declared that he had received letters from a large number of public service commissions throughout the United States urging appeal of the case to the United States supreme court. He indicated that the appeal would clear up a number of important questions in which the state commissions are interested. The expense of the appeal would not be great, Thomas said.
