postponed the request for establishment of a private kindergarten in the Lincoln school building. The board may legally permit use of school property for such a kindergarten, according to an opinion obtained from C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction.

Bid of the Commercial Book store to supply school magazines for the coming year at cost of \$195 was accepted. Patton's book store bid \$105.50 and Goodall of Eugene, \$115.50.

Only two bids were turned in for supplying fuel oil for Parrish junior high school and coal for Leslie D. A. Larmer bid \$8.10 a ton on the coal, \$1.40 per 42-gallon barrel on the oil; F. A. Loose, \$6.95 on the coal and \$1.41 on the oil. Bids were referred to the Fuel and Coal committee.

Fairview Requests Tuition for Boys

Request of the Fairview school board to remit tuition for two Salem boys who together attended school there for a total of seven and one-half years was disregarded.

High school hall floors will be coated with floor seal instead of oil this year, the directors decided.

Park school south and west roofs were ordered resingled at an estimated cost of \$150.

The matter of repair of the leaky Richmond school tin roof, which the contractor guaranteed for 10 years and has been laid less than that period, was referred to the building committee to be taken up with the contractor. Complaint was made by the janitor that the contractor had neglected to inspect the roof and make good his verbal promise.

Repair of the grandstand roof, improperly laid in the first place, at Olinger field, was referred to the building committee, as was the matter of new bicycle racks at Parrish junior high school.

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., Aug. 9 (AP)—Libby Homan's whereabouts remained a deep secret tonight, more than 24 hours after the former Broadway singer made a brief court appearance yesterday to surrender and make bond on a charge of slaying her young tobacco millionaire husband, Smith Reynolds.

Her father, Alfred Holman of Cincinnati, would not say where Libby had gone, and her local attorneys asserted they did not know.

One of them, Banet Polikoff, indicated she was probably riding by night and resting by day to avoid the stares of the curious. Polikoff revealed this arrangement had been followed when she baffled officers of several states seeking to arrest her, and arrived unnoted yesterday in Winston, 50 miles west from here.

The men entering the Hawaiian department will sail from San Francisco aboard the army transport on August 17; those entering the Philippine service will sail from the same port aboard the transport Republic on September 21.

Some 25 vacancies in the infantry, both Hawaiian and Philippine Islands, are still open, according to the sergeant, whose headquarters are on the second floor of the postal building here.

BRITAIN ACCLAIMS STIMSON ATTITUDE

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The Evening Star, only London afternoon newspaper that commented today on Secretary of State Stimson's pronouncement on American foreign policy, said editorially that his speech in New York last night should mark a definite advance in the organization of world peace and stimulate disarmament.

"The acceptance of Mr. Stimson's interpretation of the Kellogg pact—and it seems to us that no nation can sanely reject it—gives that security which is desired by nations and should mark a new era in the progress of international peace," the Star said.

The Manchester Guardian, applying Mr. Stimson's speech to the Manchurian problem, through which the Guardian has been an outspoken critic of the Japanese Asiatic policy, said America and the League of Nations powers were not committed to recognition of the existing situation in Manchuria.

CASUALTIES HEAVY IN BRAZIL BATTLE

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Heavy casualties were reported today as Brazilian federal troops claimed further gains against the rebels of Sao Paulo on various fronts.

Refugees said the rebels had lost 1000 men in one sector alone and their hospitals were crowded. General Waldomiro Lima, commander of federal forces striving to dislodge the rebels along the entire length of the southern Sao Paulo border, reported by radio that his troops had captured Itapora.

General Goes Monteiro, another federal leader, said his men had made steady gains near Queluz, which is barely within Sao Paulo state, but admitted that the rebels' resistance was "tenacious" and said the casualties were heavy.

DYING MAN TELLS FOUL PLAY STORY

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9.—(AP)—The county coroner's office this afternoon reported that no marks of physical violence indicating he had met with foul play were found on the body of Jack Strom, 29, Portland logger who died at his home this morning.

Police said Strom had said that two men robbed him, beat him, then threw him in the Willamette river from the sea wall Monday night.

Detectives investigating the death expressed doubt as to the correctness of incidents Strom was said to have related. They said that they believed Strom had been in the river because his clothes were wet and Dr. Russell S. Welch, physician attending him, told them water and sand came from Strom's lungs while he was being treated; but that they doubted he had been beaten up.

Postage Boost Has No Effect On Mail Volume

With a month passed since the postage rate increases went into

effect, local postal officials have noted virtually no change in the volume of matter mailed here. The daily average of letters has remained at 18,000 to 19,000, the same as when the rate was two cents per ounce instead of three. No accurate estimate of the effect of increased rates can be made until a six months' period has passed, according to Assistant Postmaster Gibbard. On account of variations in statehouse business, the mailing varies greatly.

HYMN WRITER HELD AS WIFE'S SLAYER

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Aug. 9.—(AP)—The Rev. S. A. Boerrie, who authorities say, paused in the penning of hymns to compose love lyrics to a 19-year-old girl, was indicted today on a charge of murdering his first wife.

While the county grand jury was returning the indictment, the 53 year old pastor sat untrifled in jail, humming the bars of a new hymn and frequently scribbling off notes with a stubby pencil. An attorney said the preacher was "not at all worried."

Berrie was married within two months after the alleged poison death to Ida Bass Bright, Sunday school teacher in his church.

The bride, already exonerated by officials as "an unfortunate victim of circumstances," allegedly was the recipient of impassioned poems which investigators said the clergyman wrote even before his wife died.

The hymnist, who wrote both words and music for such hymns as "In Beulah Land," "I shall Wear a Crown Some Day," and "Over in the Glory Land," was said by prosecutors to have sent his future bride verses with such titles as "Hark, Hark, the Lark," "Joy and Sunshine," "Alone in the Dark," and "Who Cares."

FIRM STAND TAKEN TO HALT VIOLENCE

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The government tonight invoked extraordinary powers, including the death penalty, in an effort to put a stop to outbreaks of political violence which have resulted in the killing of at least 140 persons and serious injuries to more than 1000 since June 1.

With the approval of President Paul von Hindenburg, three emergency decrees were issued by Chancellor von Papen.

One of these extended the political truce to September 1. Another set up heavy penalties, including sentence of death, for acts of terrorism. The third instituted special "speed" courts to deal summarily with offenders.

Tonight's publication of the decrees coincided with further outbreaks in which two men were killed.

At Dillenburg a young Reichsbannerman was shot dead at his window. At Dortmund a communist was shot dead from an auto-

mobile. Fierce fighting at the funeral of a national socialist victim in Chemnitz resulted in the arrest of 19 persons.

HOME LOAN BANK BOARD ORGANIZES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The board of directors of the new federal home loan discount bank system organized today and immediately began formulating policies to ease the burden on struggling home-owners and those holding non-liquid real estate mortgages valued at billions.

President Hoover greeted the bi-partisan board of five at the White House shortly after they were sworn by E. W. Libby, chief clerk at the commerce department.

Obviously pleased that the last of his economic rehabilitation projects approved by congress was getting under way, President Hoover cheerfully wished them "good luck," in their new endeavors.
