

MERGER THEME OF JOINT MEET

Gillette Terms Measure "Moving Bill"; Powell And Morlan Speak

DALLAS, Aug. 9.—About 25 citizens of Monmouth attended the dinner Friday night with members of the Kiwanis club and chamber of commerce. C. F. Gillette, attorney of Monmouth, made the introductory speech and outlined the proposed changes in the so-called school consolidation bill.

Mr. Gillette termed it a "moving bill" since it is proposed to move the university to Corvallis, Eugene to become a teachers' training college, LaGrande and Ashland to become junior colleges with the law school in Salem and the medical school in Portland. The number of units to be maintained would be the same as at the present time, under the same board and the same millage tax.

Ira C. Powell spoke of the housing difficulties to be encountered under the proposed changes, that Corvallis with a population of 7500 would find it difficult to house the additional students and faculty when Eugene has a population of 18,000. He spoke of the heavy municipal obligations that Monmouth and Eugene have assumed in order to meet the requirements for adequate need of the schools.

Valuation of the Monmouth plant is given as \$712,000 and property valuations would drop at least one-quarter million if the Monmouth plant is closed. Howard Morlan gave figures on the cost per student in schools in other states and the investment represented per student. The cost per year per student at Corvallis and Eugene was given as \$251, in Michigan \$547 and in California \$458. There are 60 faculty members per thousand students at the university, and 75 at Corvallis.

PHILIP LINN CLAN MEETS, ESTACADA

HUBBARD, Aug. 9.—About 135 attended the 14th annual reunion Sunday of the descendants of Philip Linn, at Dinty Moore's park near Estacada. This park is part of the land bought by Philip Linn after crossing the plains in 1865.

The original party of 33 consisted of the family of Philip Linn and the families of six of his children. Three of this party are still living, two sons of Estacada, Philip E. and Granville, who is the president of the Linn clan, and a grandson of Estacada, Matthew Lonsberry, who is the secretary.

Enroute to Oregon, Matthew Lonsberry's mother died near American Falls on the Snake river in Idaho, and his father at Baker station in eastern Oregon. Matthew Lonsberry began his business career as a general merchant at Hubbard about 1877.
