avoid the return of the saloon. It is my conviction that the nature of this change, and one upon which all reasonable people can find common ground, is that each state shall be given the right to deal with the problem as it may determine, but subject to absolute guarantees in the constitution of the United States to protect each state from interference and invasion by its neighbors, and that in no part of the United States shall there be a return of the saloon system with its inevitable political and social corruption and its organized interference with other states.
American statesmanship is capable of working out such a solution and making it effective.

TELEPHONE RATES HEARING PLANNED

Will Open September 20 in
Portland; Extensive
Probe Promised

A state-wide hearing involving the rates, charges, practices and service of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company has been set for September 20 in Portland. Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner announced on Thursday. Thomas said it probably would require several weeks to take the testimony in the case.
Thomas declared that while he did not desire to make any extended comment on the investigation at this time, he was anxious to get the matter on record as soon as possible. Records in the public utilities commission show that the company is now operating in Portland for its sixth consecutive year without a franchise. The hearing was launched on motion of the commission.
This will be the first state-wide hearing on telephone rates in Oregon since 1922. The previous hearing was held in Salem before members of the old public service commission, and lasted 14 weeks. Prominent rate experts from all parts of the United States testified at this hearing.
Another important hearing has been set for August 23, at Tillamook, involving the rates, charges and practices of the Tillamook unit of the Mountain States Power company. Thomas indicated that this investigation would deal particularly with valuations. Thomas will preside at both hearings.

CASE OF INTENDED ARSON SUSPECTED

A case of intended arson faced city police last night in one of the most mysterious set of criminal circumstances to develop here recently.
Residents of 446 Water street, returning home, discovered their garage door open, freshly poured gasoline soaking the gravel and sawdust driveway, and the lock of their new automobile picked. Judging from the fact that the gasoline had not yet evaporated, they were of the opinion some one intended to burn the car and had been frightened away by their approach.
The owner of the car, whose name they did not learn, and is not listed in the city directory, removed both his automobiles to a garage for the night.

EARLE JENNINGS IS SOLOIST FOR BAND

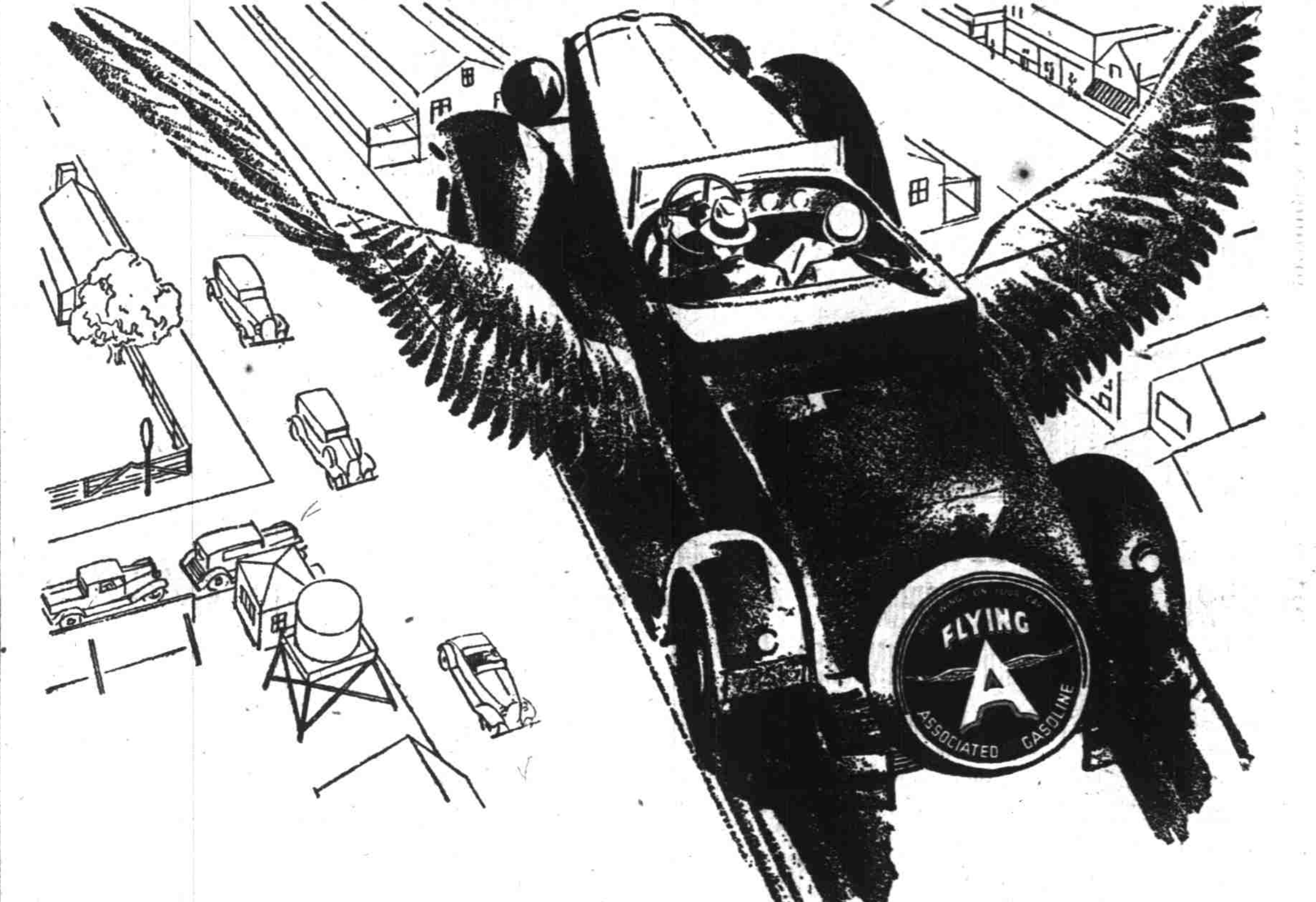

UNION MEN OPPOSE MINING WAGE CUT

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Union miners dissatisfied with the new \$5 basic wage scale negotiated by their district officials held a protest demonstration in front of one of the reopened shafts here today but dispersed quietly at the appearance of police.
Meanwhile impetus was given a state-wide movement to override the action of officials who pronounced the new rate effective last night when theft of referendum ballots halted the vote count.
"We regard the mine reopenings as the greatest single factor for better business during recent months in the midwest," said D. W. Buchanan, chairman of the Illinois mine operators wage committee, at Chicago.
It was estimated 3000 men, the vanguard of 150,000 miners, went to work in Illinois today as a result of the new scale.
Girl's Body is Found Hanging; Deemed Suicide
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 11 — (AP)—Annette Ramsley, 29, Portland, died today as the result of what police described as suicide.
Her body was discovered hanging from a bathroom railing in Piero Belluschi's apartment in what is known as Portland's artists' colony. The girl was fully clothed.
Police said they were told Miss Ramsley had been subject to periods of despondency for some time. Police said they believe Belluschi's plans to visit his parents in Italy soon increased the girl's despondency.

TRUCE IN BOLIVIA DISPUTE DOUBTFUL

ASUNCION, Paraguay, Aug. 11 — (AP)—Sources close to the government said today Paraguay would not resume negotiations over the disputed Gran Chaco territory until Bolivia evacuated forts which it recently captured.
Paraguay continued to wonder, these sources said, at the acceptance by the neutral American nations of a truce between Paraguay and Bolivia without Bolivian evacuation of the seized forts.
LA PAZ, Bolivia, Aug. 11 — (AP)—Bolivia replied to a note of the United States and other American nations today with a declaration it would accept no suspension of hostilities with Paraguay unless the present positions in the Gran Chaco were maintained.
The neutrals' note had urged arbitration of the Chaco dispute between the two countries.
