OLD HAYDEN HOME BEING TORN DOWN

Razing of the house at North 15th and Marion, known as the old Judge Ben Hayden home, sees another familiar landmark go into oblivion. Incidentally, the wreckers say that a lesson in wood construction may be gained from this house, as the beams have hardened almost like steel. Parts of the wood will be used in other structures.

The house was built about 1875 by a man named Reed, and later purchased by Judge Ben Hayden, during whose ownership in the late 80's and 90's it was the scene of many prominent social events and gatherings. It remained in the Hayden family until after the death of "Bill" Hayden.

A pit in the brick basement caused considerable curiosity among the wreckers. Miller Hayden, justice of the peace here and grandson of Judge Hayden, recalled that this was used to store rainwater.

Jacob Conser Bridge Is Town's Proposal
