

# Whiskers Will Flap in Breeze on Olinger Field Today

## DAVIDITES WILL OPPOSE SOLONS

Bearded Ones won in Last Appearance Here but Haven't Always

Long whiskers and long hair will flap in the breeze this afternoon on Olinger field when the House of David baseball team will meet the Salem Senators. These bearded boys have played here a number of times in the past and never have failed to draw the record crowd of the season. Neither have they failed to deserve it by the brand of ball exhibited, for the novelty of the beards and braided hair is by no means the sole attraction.

On their last appearance here two years ago, the House of David boys managed to pull out with a 9 to 1 victory although the Senators staged a fine rally in the first inning to acquire a big bulge on the visitors.

On that occasion "Doc" Tally, known as the "Bearded Babe Ruth," pitched against the Senators. He will play left field today. He had a good season in 1930, the one year he pitched, but evidently wasn't at his best that day, as the Solons collected a 14 hits. Andy Peterson hit a triple—but you couldn't condemn Tally on that account.

Of the House of David players who participated here on that occasion, Tucker, first baseman; McCafferty, third; Fleming, catcher; and Tally will be the only ones playing today, although others are still with the club. It is not known which one of the five pitchers will work, they are Gilbert, Bass, Neve, Radloff and Noel. Radloff and Gilbert pitched at Eugene early this week, the Townies winning after being held scoreless for seven innings. The bearded ones defeated Bend in a recent game.

Games between the House of David and the Senators have not all gone the same way. In 1929 the Senators won 9 to 3, with Wayne Barham holding the visitors in check after the first inning. Fitzke, former northwest collegian, who recently broke into the Los Angeles lineup as a pitcher, hurled that day for the Davidites. Billy Sullivan hit a triple and a homer, but the big feature of that game was the stunt of Dewhurst, giant youth who played left field for the visitors and sprinted in to cover the plate when all his mates forgot.

Today Squeek Wilson will attempt the difficult task of holding the House of David hitters in check. Otherwise the Senator lineup will be the same as in recent State league games.

## Japanese Swimmers Move Into 10 Point Lead With One Day of Events Left

By PAUL ZIMMERMAN OLYMPIC SWIMMING STADIUM, Los Angeles, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The spell of the orient pervaded the aquatic carnival of the Tenth Olympiad today, as Japan swept in no uncertain fashion into the team leadership with only one day to go.

Olympic records fell in three events as the championships moved swiftly toward their conclusion before a capacity crowd of 12,000 persons.

On the other hand, Uncle Sam's mermals continued to better their standing. Suffering from dislocated ribs and a back injury which she sustained in practice yesterday, Dorothy Poynton, 16-year-old Hollywood girl, braved her injuries and won the high diving championship in the morning with 40.26 points.

The event provided another sweep for the United States, with Georgia Coleman, Los Angeles, winner of the spring-board title, taking second place. Marion Dale Roper, University of California at Los Angeles co-ed, was third.

As a closing gesture, the American women's relay quartet left the rest of the world in its wake as it sliced 9.6 seconds off the Olympic record for 400 meters, winning in 4 minutes 35 seconds.

The sweep for the Japanese in the 100 meter backstroke gave them a point total of 56, with three events to go, as against 46 for the United States. Triumphs in the relay and diving gave the

United States women a total of eighty points for first place in the team standings, with Australia second, with 17, Great Britain third with 15, and Holland fourth with 10.

With the aid of three double plays, the junior ball team from Olinger playground yesterday afternoon defeated the Lincoln Rail-splitters by a 7-to-7 score.

The powerful, rangy Australian stood off the closing challenge of Bill Miller of Philadelphia, United States champion, to win the day's feature race by a good three-quarters of a length, in the slow time of 7:44 2-5.

Four of the seven Olympic championships were decided during the afternoon and the United States jumped into the lead for team honors by scoring its first victory in Olympic history in the final for pair-oared boats, with Coxswain.

This was the last event of the day and two powerful young Philadelphia boys from the Penn. A. C. Charley Kieffer and Joe Schuauers, with the veteran Ed Jennings steering, scored a decisive victory over Poland, with France third and Brazil last.

Great Britain and Germany divided the day's other honors. The veteran British pair-oared combination, C. I. V. and Edwards, with Coxswain, beat New Zealand, Poland and Holland handily after Germany's four-oared boat, with Coxswain, came from behind with a sensational closing sprint to nip Poland by a foot in the most exciting race of the afternoon.

With four titles decided, the American oarsmen led with 15 points, scored unofficially on a 10-5-4-3 basis for the finalists in each race. Poland and Great Britain were tied for second with 13 each, while Australia had 10, thanks to Pearce's victory, Germany the same and New Zealand eight.

The regatta will be completed tomorrow with the University of California's undefeated crew.

## BOBBY PEARCE ROWING CHAMP

First Repeater; U. S. Gets Lead on Points, Wins Pair-Oared Race

By ALAN GOULD MARINE STADIUM, Long Beach, Calif., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Demonstrating his complete mastery over the world's foremost amateur rowers, despite an unexpectedly strong challenge from his American rival, Henry Robert Pearce of Australia today captured the Olympic single sculls championship for the second straight time.

Pearce thereby became the first oarsman in Olympic history to repeat in the solo event.

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## France Awarded Yachting Crown

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—(AP)—By a margin of only two points France displaced Holland as official winner of the Olympic championship of the Olympic games yachting races by a decision on a protest and was awarded the title today. A judge's decision taking eight points from the French boat's total was reversed on appeal to the Olympic protest committee and this decided the championship.

## U. S. FENCER WINS

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—(AP)—John R. Huffman of the United States fencing team fought his way into the company of the traditional saber victors, the Hungarians, in today's semi-finals of the individual saber competition of the Olympic Games.

## Haircut is Wage For Hour's Work

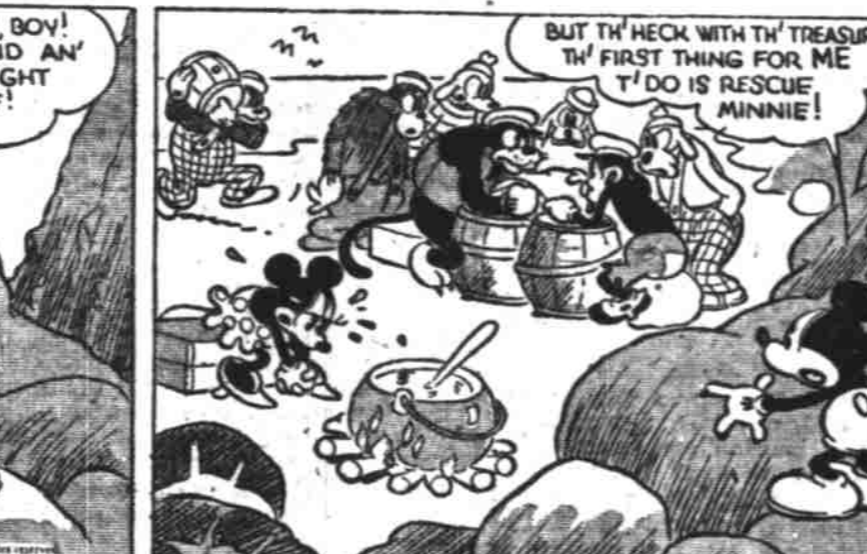
