Sherman County Railroad Service Protests Denied

The public utilities commission Monday dismissed petitions from

individuals and firms of Grass Valley, More and Kent, protesting against reduction of train service on the Shanks branch of the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company.

Railroad officials promised to protect shipments from More, Kent and Grass Valley through the operation of extra trains. Curtailment of the railroad service will save the operating company approximately \$9000 a year.

Licenses Still 54,906 Beneath Year Ago Mark

A total of 157,524 motor vehicle licenses for the current year had been issued at the close of business here Saturday night, it was announced by the secretary of state. These did not include Saturday's mail applications. Registrations up to Saturday

night were 54,906 less than on the corresponding date a year ago. Total receipts of license plates up to Friday night were \$4,107,394, as compared to \$5,404,141 on the corresponding date in 1931.

Mail applications are being received in large numbers, the secretary of state said.
