bottom records. A big decrease of \$4,000,000 bushels in estimates of world import requirements of wheat, compared with last year, had an unsettling effect, and so too did New York stock market setbacks. Forecasts of North America's 1932 wheat exportable surplus went beyond figures on the world's probable takings.

Wheat closed nervous, at a fractional upturn from the day's low, but 14-% under yesterday's finish, corn uhchanged to down, oats %-% off.

STOP LOSS SELLING HURTS GRAIN

WOODBURN, Aug. 17 - The Ray-Brown cannery here will put up a pear pack again this year, although the amount of fruit to be canned or the length of the season is not known. The first car-for hydrants and hose couplings. rived here this week and as the fruit has ripened rapidly in the special ripening sheds, it will be canned soon. This year a new system of preparing the pears will be tested. A number of machines for

peeling the fruit have arrived. If the machines are successful much hand labor will be done away with, as before this all the pears have been peeled by hand. Several times pear peeling machines have been tried at the plant but the results were never before satisfactory. In other years the pear canning season has extended to the early part of November. Reports are that about 500 tons

of evergreen blackberries will also be canned this year. The blackberry crop in this vicinity is very good this year, so that if 500 tons are picked there will still be tons of the fruit left on the vines.

It is not known whether prunes will be canned this year. In other years enormous packs of prunes were run through. Work at the cannery will probably not be steady for the first week or so, as the pears usually do not ripen.
