

SINO-JAPANESE TROUBLE BOBS UP ONCE MORE

Tokyo Representatives say Boycott Being Revived Around Shanghai

Consul General Avers Move Backed by Chambers of Commerce, Papers

SHANGHAI, Aug. 18.—(AP)—The controversy partly responsible for the destructive Sino-Japanese conflict of last winter has bobbed up again to disturb the peace of the far east.

Consul General Kuramatsu Mural of Japan today submitted to Mayor W. T. Chen of Greater Shanghai a sharp protest against what he termed the revival of the anti-Japanese boycott by Chinese terrorist organizations.

Consul General Mural, himself wounded by a bomb in the hands of a crazed Korean in March, charged chambers of commerce in many Chinese cities were backing up these "lawless elements" with the intention of stifling Japanese trade.

Moreover, he accused Chinese papers of stirring up the Chinese people by publishing editorials "encouraging hostility toward Japan."

Threatens Trouble If Move Continues

Unless Chinese authorities suppress the agitators, he warned, the situation "is likely again to assume a grave aspect."

Suppression of the anti-Japanese boycott was one of four demands the Japanese naval commander made in an ultimatum threatening to occupy the Chinese section of Shanghai last January.

Chinese authorities after prolonged negotiations accepted the ultimatum but the Japanese accused them of bad faith and landed an expeditionary force of marines and fought the prelude to the destruction of Chapel and Woosung with the loss of thousands of lives and millions of dollars in property.

GRAIN GROWERS WILL NOT SELL

No Strike but Widespread Belief Wheat Will go Higher ere Long

above said. However, there is still a chance for the Canadian crop production to be lowered, as danger times are not over until the wheat is harvested. A materially lower production there might alter the situation.

Surplus in Nadles Above 1921 Figure

The wheat surplus in this country now is estimated to be 38 million bushels larger than a year ago, and while the crop for this year is estimated at only 700 million bushels as compared to 890 million bushels last year, the high carryover cuts into prospects for higher price on base of lowered production this year.

"Farmers can't pay the mortgage on 50-cent wheat, and the banker knows it, so he has more or less given up trying to collect until the farmer has something to pay with. That's probably the main reason why the farmers around here are able to hold their grain for higher prices."

Thus is the apathy of the farmer to sell explained by another local dealer.

If Canadian wheat produces as now estimated, this dealer foresees a lower price than now quoted for the farmer here, in which event the avowed holding tendencies in sections of this country will boot the farmer nothing.

FORGERY COUNT IS FACED BY PORTER

WOODBURN, Aug. 18.—Lloyd Porter, who was arrested Tuesday by State Officer Farley Morgan on a charge of check forging, was bound over to the grand jury after a hearing Thursday morning before Justice of the Peace Hiram Overton. Porter was brought from Salem for the hearing. The claim was that Porter forged and passed a check at the Howard Ramp store at Brooks August 8. Sam Ramp testified that Porter had cashed the check and said that Porter had asked him for a pencil to write his signature, but Ramp could not swear positively that Porter had signed a name. Porter, however, claimed that after asking for a pencil he decided not to affix his signature, as it was signed by a person who goes by the name of Cranfield. Porter claimed that he got the check from Cranfield. Cranfield's story, according to Porter, was that he had worked for A. M. German pulling onions and placing dead-men for hop poles, and that German gave him the check. Porter readily admitted that he cashed the check but denied that he had signed the paper or was in any way guilty of the charge. He agreed to pay the amount of the check and court costs if Howard Ramp would drop the charge. Overton decided that he will be held to answer to the circuit court. Porter's bail was set at \$500.

JULY BUSY MONTH FOR HEALTH STAFF

July was a busy time for members of the Marion county health department staff. The monthly report, presented to the executive committee at its meeting yesterday afternoon, showed the following activities for the month and yearly totals:

Visits to communicable disease patients, 97; 95 diphtheria immunizations completed, 778 for the year to date; 51 smallpox vaccinations, 501 for the year; 97 visits to the health center; 25 clinics held; 1182 tuberculosis tests administered this year, with 29 of the persons examined further by fluoroscope; 106 visits to infants, 872 this year; 37 home visits, 278 this year; 56 home visits to preschool children, 349 this year, and 35 clinics for preschool children, 249 this year; 58 school children given health examinations.

Milk control—Ninety-four visits to producers and distributors made by the dairy inspector; one producer degraded last month, 33 during the year.

Laboratory work—Thirty-eight diphtheria cultures developed, 20 blood tests made.

FEWER CARS BURN UP, REPORT SHOWS

Destruction of motor vehicles by accident or fire and erroneous payments of registration fees are becoming fewer, according to statistics released at the state department Thursday.

The average monthly total of refunds up until July 31 of the present year was \$163.88 or a total of \$1,147.21. The average monthly refund in 1931 was \$10.75.

Although disbursements for refunds have decreased, the number of claims were said to have been more numerous during the past few months than ever before.

Auditors of the state department make a close examination of all refund claims in cooperation with the division of state police.

In order to obtain a refund it is necessary for the applicant to submit an affidavit indicating when and where the motor vehicle was destroyed, the certificate of title and license plates.

Only registered owners of motor vehicles are entitled to refunds.

ANTAGONISM FROM EUGENE REGRETTED

Salem not Backing Merger Plan, Assurance Given By Local Builders

An effort to "spike" reported Eugene antagonism toward Salem as outgrowth of the higher education merger initiative bill is taken by the Salem chapter of the Oregon Building Congress in a letter yesterday addressed to E. M. Drew, president of the building congress at Portland.

The letter was drawn by L. R. Schoettler, secretary of the Salem chapter, after attention was brought to the local board of directors by the Eugene chapter in a letter yesterday addressed to E. M. Drew, president of the building congress at Portland.

Although half the population of Marion county centers in Salem, the attitude that Salem is responsible for action of the tax league is unjustified, the letter indicates.

"We do not believe that this attitude (of Eugene) is justified by the facts and we wish at this time to record the fact that the Salem chapter is not now supporting, nor has it ever in any way supported, the Marion county taxpayers' league."

"Further, to our knowledge, no Salem civic organization has either openly or otherwise given support to the taxpayers' league, or to the movement. This is the first time that the matter has been discussed by the chapter."

DEATH RATE GAINS IN MARION COUNTY

The death rate in Marion county has increased this year while the birth rate has decreased, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, reported to the health department executive committee yesterday. Births, however, exceeded deaths last month.

During July 90 births were recorded, 44 of them male. Up to August 1, there have been 510 births against 556 for the same period of last year.

Last month there were 57 deaths in the county, bringing the year's total to 417, an increase of 45 over 1931. Infant deaths, on the other hand, number 20 this year, 13 less than last year.

Infant deaths this year have resulted from communicable diseases, eight of them in July. Pneumonia and tuberculosis were the chief causes. Others were cancer, 7, kidney trouble 12, heart disease 5, aplasia 2 and diabetes 1.

Automobile accidents this year have caused 19 deaths, an increase of nine over the same period of 1931. Three of the automobile deaths occurred last month.

DISEASE CASES IN COUNTY ONLY NINE

But nine cases of the more serious communicable diseases occurred in Marion county during July, according to the health department report. These were diphtheria two, scarlet fever two, typhoid one and tuberculosis four.

Diphtheria cases to August 1 numbered 12, against 16 for the same period last year; scarlet fever 15 against 35. Typhoid cases numbered four, against none for ever before.

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the same period last year; and tuberculosis 25 against 35.

The fewer communicable diseases have occurred this year as follows:

Chickpox 140 against 118 last year; measles 103 against 339; mumps 86 against 490; whoopingcough 114 against 14, and influenza 318 against 17. This year there have been further influenza whoopingcough and measles. Last year the minor epidemics were in measles and mumps.

One case of malaria has been reported this year, 10 cases of erysipelas, 15 of Vincent's angina and two of sleeping sickness.

ALLEN KEIL FINED ON LIQUOR CHARGE

WOODBURN, Aug. 18.—Tuesday was a busy day in justice court here. Allen K. Keil, who lives near Aurora, was fined \$100 and placed on probation for a year after he had pleaded guilty to making liquor on his family farm. Keil is a young man, still in his teens.

Harry Levy, a Portland truck driver, was fined \$15 in the court. Levy declared he did not have the necessary amount, so he was taken to the county jail at Salem.

A tourist from Georgia, Raymond Barnes, was also an unwilling visitor to the court here, having been picked up by state police on a charge of driving with four adults in the front seat of his car.

He was accompanied by a boy friend and two girls, whom he claimed to have picked up. The girls said they were from Missouri. As Barnes claimed he was unfamiliar with the state's four-in-the-front-seat law, he was given the minimum fine of \$2.50.

BLACKBERRY PACK STARTS, WOODBURN

Highest Price Paid Growers Is Cent and Quarter; Pears Coming in

WOODBURN, Aug. 18.—Blackberries were received at the warehouse of the Woodburn Cooperative Fruit Growers' association for the first time this season Wednesday. The receipt of the evergreens was heavy the first day, and the fruit was of good quality. According to Ray Glatt, secretary of the association, the berries are being shipped to Portland and Vancouver.

The association has contracted for between 130 and 140 tons. The growers are receiving a cent and a quarter a pound for the berries. Pickers are receiving three-quarters of a cent.

Glatt stated that the Ray-Brown cannery will probably start receiving the evergreens "within the next few days." The cannery will probably pay the independent growers a cent a pound.

Pears Coming In

Wednesday was the first day of the pear canning season at the Ray-Brown cannery here. Only a small crew of men and women was hired to try out the new automatic pear peeling machines and do the other necessary work. Wednesday's work was somewhat temporary, as more ripe pears will not probably be ready till Saturday. A car of the green pears was received Wednesday afternoon from the Medford district. They will probably be ripe enough for canning Saturday, after which the work will probably be quite steady for two months or more.
