Juniors may Live in Town
Despite Ruling; Faculty
Changes Hinted

MONMOUTH, Aug. 19.—Householders of Monmouth who maintain students homes for men and for women attending the Oregon Normal school, discussed features and plans for the coming year with President J. A. Churchill at Jessica Todd hall Monday afternoon.

Dean Helen Anderson will take over her duties as dean of women here in about three weeks. She comes from Ashland. Mrs. Ardie Parker who has served as preceptress of the dormitory for several years will remain in the

same capacity. Miss Barbara Nelson of Portland, a graduate of the normal, is the new secretary to the dean.

Friends to Live in Town
Considerable anxiety had been indicated by various householders over a ruling announced last year, and presumed to become effective this fall, that no juniors would be permitted to live in private homes, but would be housed on the campus in the several dormitories all operated by the state. President Churchill promptly allayed this rumor, saying that juniors would be as free as seniors to live in any approved homes in town.

He also made the fact plain that rules governing students in private homes are to conform strictly to the dormitory schedule; and that any householder failing to so comply will immediately be dropped from the accredited list which is approved by authorities of the school.

Drainage Project Done
William L. La Due and a crew of several helpers have opened a drainage ditch on Senate street, from Franklin to Plaza and from Plaza to the city park, where it will be drained by gravitation to the river. The men have worked for a week completing the work Wednesday evening. A special test given West Salem's city water by D. H. Burnett, regular official who has charge of that work, showed a bacteriological content of only 3 per cent. There is a regular weekly test made, but this was a special request, and showed the water to be unusually pure and good.

The West Salem box factory is a busy place these days, supplying boxes for prunes, crates and boxes for peaches, cases for canned goods for the canneries and packing concerns as well as filling standing orders for paper mill boxes. At present there are to go 40,000 knocked down apple boxes to Hood River, and the factory will deliver these by truck. The lumber supply for these commodities comes by rail from several sources and the making of boxes, cases and crates together with all the work involved requires 22 men putting in full time in a regular day shift. By-products in the shape of box wood, sawdust and hog fuel are sold and the latter is conveyed by cyclone and blower to a bin, and dump wagons are served and filled from a chute below the elevator and conveyor.
