LYONS, Aug. 19. — The small farmhouse on the S. D. Brown place in Fox Valley was completely destroyed by fire of unknown origin Wednesday morning. Mr. and Mrs. George Crooks were living in the house. Mrs. S. D. Brown saw the flames and summoned help. Most of the belongings of the Crooks were saved.

A number of men were soon at the scene, as the house is on the highway and motorists halted to assist and the fire was kept from spreading to nearby homes.

A milk room adjoining the house was also burned. It is understood the buildings were covered by insurance. The Crooks moved the remaining household furnishings to Mill City.

Another knight of the highway, walking across the United States for his health, dropped into Salem yesterday, here to spend the night through the generosity of the American Legion. He is Samuel Labowitz of Baltimore, Md., who 18 weeks ago set out to walk to San Francisco and back in an attempt to recover from injuries which had kept him often

abed since the World war. When Labowitz arrives in the city of the golden gate he will first look up Mayor Angelo J. Rossi, to present a letter of greeting which he bears from Mayor Howard W. Jackson of Baltimore. Then, after looking the city over, he expects to start the homeward hike.

Labowitz, however, may not get to San Francisco. He likes Oregon, he says, and wants to obtain a homestead somewhere in the state. To this end he conferred with Waldo Mills, local legion service officer, yesterday and was advised to take up the matter with federal authorities at Roseburg.

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
