PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20 — (AP) — Behind Koupal's airtight pitching Portland defeated the Seattle Indians in tonight's ball game here, 14 to 1.

The game clinched the series for the Ducks, who have taken four of the five games played. Koupal pitched almost airtight ball and was aided in keeping down the Indian side of the score by some spectacular fielding on the part of Finney, who made a diving outfield catch of Nelson's fly near the right field foul line then flipped Cox at first for a double play.

Seattle stepped out with a run in the first inning, but was unable to score thereafter. Portland did its scoring in twin clusters: 1 run each in the first and second innings, four runs each in the third and sixth innings and two runs each in the seventh and eighth innings.

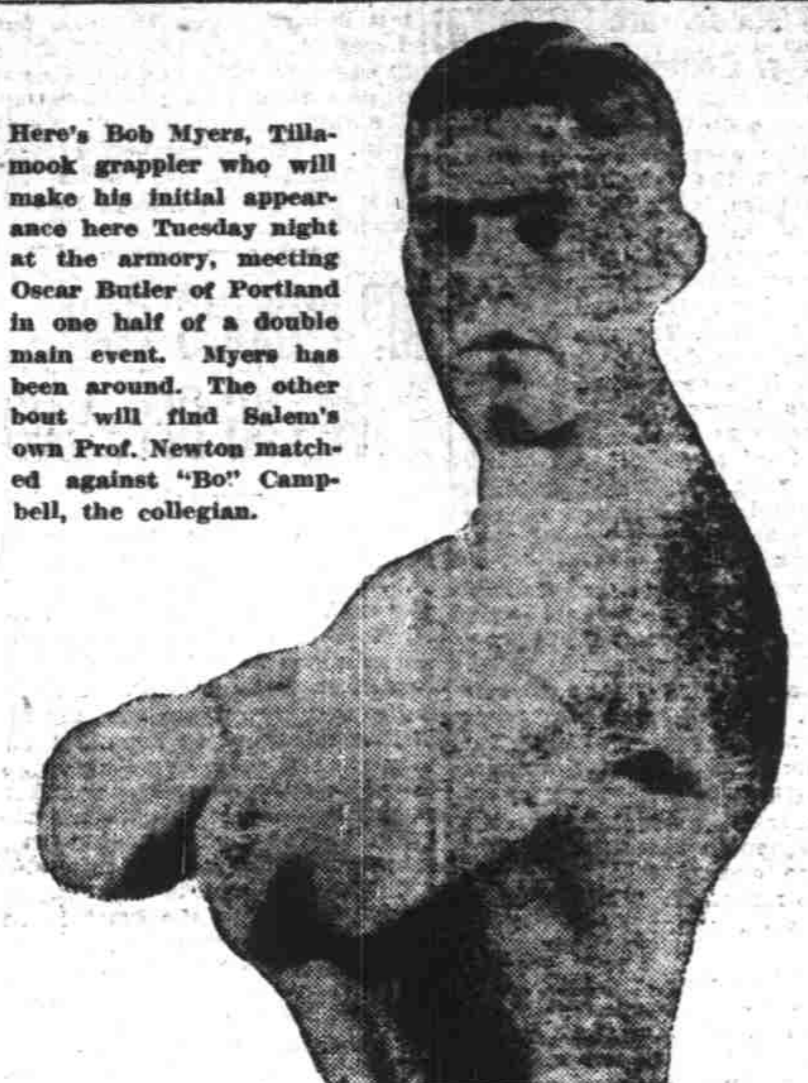
Flutter Boards To be Installed At Y Tank Here

The Salem Senators will wind up their State league season, and probably will hang up their "tools" for the year, with today's game at Albany. The game will have little bearing on the standings in the State league, which, except for this game, closed its regular season last Sunday. However, by a victory today the Solons would finish the season on an even keel with five games won and five games lost.

"Sneak" Wilson will start on the mound for the Senators with Frank "Burl" Bashor behind the bat. Otherwise there will be no change in the Solons' lineup except that Walt Erickson will be unable to participate and "Trax" Foreman will probably take his place in left field.

Jack Woodard of Corvallis, who pitched the Chicks to victory over the Senators Wednesday, will try to repeat for Albany, according to word from that city. He may succeed but on the other hand, may find the regular Senator batting order more difficult to stop.

Although the Senators are probably through playing ball for the year, their names will be heard again before next spring. Manager Bashor has lined up several capable hoopers for that time. The new team, which will introduce something new in sports entertainment for Salem fans—Sunday afternoon basketball.

## DEAR CURT COMMENTS

In your vehement tirade against sponsors of football programs you obviously forgot the one argument left in your favor. While not wishing to enter into any prolonged controversy, it seems to me your arguing takes in a large territory when it implies the possibility of a real football fan staying away from a game. If the fan hasn't the necessary cash to witness a game a suitable alternative would be to hear the broadcast. Consequently no harm is lost, and the football authorities, who are after all amateurs, are nothing out. Thousands like myself are of the opinion handed down by the Pacific Coast Conference, and they had no objection to radio broadcasts.

## A FOOTBALL FAN.

Showing that it's all a matter of the point of view. Our theory is that sports are for the masses; not the masses of fans but the masses of obscure athletes and teams. That's why on this sport page we emphasize what's going on in Salem and vicinity, sometimes at the expense of irritating those fans whose interests lie far afield where national and world championships are discussed.

And that explains our attitude on broadcasting—or rather half of it. If the broadcast keeps people away from the perfectly good, though not nationally acclaimed, football played around here, we're opposed to it. The other half is that radio is a parasite, reaping where it does not sow.

of some summer work because the high license fee became due in August, is not forgetting and is putting the blame on Hoos. The secretary has recently come out strongly for a drastic reduction in auto license fees; obviously this is to counteract that had taste politically engendered by his fight with Meier.

As the end of 1932 approaches, and income and expenditure of the state government are computed, it becomes very apparent that savings in costs are by no means equal to the reductions in state revenues. That means the deficit at the end of 1932 is going to be considerably larger. More important, it means that the state tax commission next December must not again overestimate future revenues for if it does the deficit will keep on mounting and there will speedily come a time when the state treasury will be as flat as the purse of an insular stockholder. The treasury can squeeze by while a considerable deficit exists because of other funds it holds and uses temporarily. However, when the state deficit climbs about \$3,000,000 the treasury will run dry.

The core of the matter is that unless the voters of Oregon pass the higher income tax law in November, the state is headed for a general tax on property or pass some special tax to take its place or continue to over-estimate income and thus to add to a deficit already burdensome.
