the base of the pinnacle at 8:30. The clouds were so thick they were forced to wait three-quarters of an hour. The dangerous ascent of the pinnacle took them an hour and a quarter. They returned over the snowfields to camp.

The first names in the old summit book appear under date of 1895, when three parties made the climb. One more signature appears before 1900. In 1904 and again in 1907 parties reached the summit. From then until 1914, a few scattered groups registered. No names are listed in 1915, 1918 and 1919. Five parties climbed to the summit last year and five this year.

## ENTRY INTO FIRE AREA IS CHARGED

L. O. Fernu and Douglas Barrett who appeared yesterday afternoon in Justice court charged with entering a restricted fire area without a permit, asked time to consult an attorney and entered no plea. They were to be heard today before Justice Miller Hayden.

The young men, arrested Sunday near Bristol, claim they went a short distance from camp under the understanding that they needed no permit since they had asked a ranger before they went to the springs and he had informed them no permit was needed. Later in the day they were arrested by Ranger Elliott, who filed a charge against them and four other people, in the same party.

Earlier Monday J. W. Kubbness, T. E. Preston, C. E. Dahl and T. G. Lerson had appeared on the same charge in Justice court here, had pleaded guilty and been fined \$25 each and costs. Justice Hayden remitted the fine in each case and placed the parties on six months' probation.

Fernu and Barrett said they were inside the restricted area in good faith and without knowledge a permit was needed. They indicated they would fight the charges and would defend themselves on the ground that one of the rangers had encouraged their action.

## Car-Truck Crash At Halsey Cause Of Court Action

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—P. N. Kurth, Pauline Booth and Henry H. Booth, all of Salem, have filed damage actions in circuit court here against George W. Earle, also of Salem. The plaintiffs allege the Booth car struck Earle's truck because the truck had been parked without proper lights, on the Pacific highway near Halsey. Booth seeks \$20,500 and Kurth \$4500 because of personal injuries, and Mrs. Booth seeks \$60 damages to her car.

## Prune Pack Will Be Started Soon At Local Plants

The largest pack of local fruit for the canning season is anticipated soon when the canneries start work on the coming prune crop, with indications that output might even outdistance the pear pack.

Canneries are already busy buying heavily at the rate of \$8 a ton, one company reporting purchase of 400 tons. The tonnage handled this year apparently will make up for the prevailing low prices.

## TOURIST TRAFFIC IN CANADA HEAVY

Hard times talk notwithstanding, tourist traffic through Canadian provinces this summer has been increasing at an "amazing" rate according to an article published in the Winnipeg Free Press. This traffic is having a marked effect on the movement of novelty goods at retail and is bringing heavy revenue to hotels and rooming houses.

Present indications, according to the article are that the number of visitors to Canada this year will exceed the record of 1931. Last year nearly 1,175,000 persons entered Canada by rail or steamship. Many of the tourists are drawn northward by the scenic wonders and vacation playgrounds offered by the Canadian Pacific railway over its Rocky Mountain route in the west and the lake country and French Canadian cities in the east. Long transcontinental trains leave from Vancouver, B. C., on the eastward journey each day.

The C. P. R., with its well-fitted steamships plying between Seattle, Victoria and Vancouver, and its modern trains traversing the scenic route, is one of the dominion's drawing cards to tourists.

## Clerks of Third Class Districts To Meet Friday

All clerks of third class school districts in the county have been called to a meeting here Friday, August 26, at 3 p. m., when Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county superintendent, will explain the new type of books which are to be used during the school year 1932-33. The state department of education has revised the clerk's record book, making it considerably easier to keep records.

New records for the coming year will be distributed at the coming meet. Mrs. Fulkerson is asking every clerk who possibly can to attend.

## School Tuition Bills Audited; Payment Waits

Bills of the high school in the county for 1931-1932 tuition and transportation services are being audited at the county superintendent's office here but until the tuition case is settled in the state supreme court no payments on the

bills will be made by the county. Money involved in the bills in this county is \$122,000. Ordinarily one-half of the sums due the schools is paid in the summer. Under the existing circumstance the high schools must pay for the education and transportation of the out-of-district pupils and bide their time in making the collection.
