Stayton People go to White-water, Then Turn South For 5 More Miles

STAYTON, Aug. 22 — Among local people who have recently gone over the new Santiam highway are Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Alexander and the Dr. G. P. Korinek family. They found the ten miles of completed highway above Detroit, a fine piece of work. There are several places on this piece of road where Mt. Jefferson appears before one so close as to startle one. Very little snow appears on the mountain at present.
